ROYALTIES, STOVES AND SLEEVE-LINKS.

According to a recent cable despatch King George of England and the Crown Prince of Germany have both made inventions, which, at the instance of the latter, are now protected by letters patent in Germany and elsewhere. The King's invention is said to be a fuel-saving stove or cooking range, while the inventive efforts of the German Crown Prince resulted in a set of non-slipping sleeve-links. The first thought that suggests itself in regard to these royal inventions is, how very human these Kings and Princes are, after all. Think of it! The King-Emperor, whose subjects number more than four hundred millions, and whose feet command the seven seas, taking thought for the saving of fuel in cooking. And the Crown Prince of Germany, who will some day command the most powerful army the world has yet seen, takes account of sleeve-links.

Not that stoves and sleeve-links are unimportant things in the economy of the world today. Hundreds of millions of men and women in the civilized world are interested in the modern cooking and heating stoves. The great and wise Ben-amin Franklin invented a heater which bears his name today in many lands where but for that fact his name might be forgotten. The adult masculine world throughout the entire area of civilization has long had trouble and irritation over unreliable, slipping sleeve-links. This trouble extended from the cottage to the palace, till now a scion of the royal house of Hohenzollern has grappled with the difficulty and invented links that won't slip. Wherefore the masculine world will be appreciative and grateful.

But loyal Britishers at home and beyond the seas will be most interested in King George's patent stove. Unlike the Crown Prince of Germany, whose invention arose doubtless from the trouble he himself had experienced with his cuffs—especially after they had met with reverses—King George had never any particular trouble with the cooking stoves at Buckingham, St. James or Windsor Castle. It matters little to him whether the price of coal is \$3.50 or \$4 per ton with cartage extra. His salary is sufficient to make the price of coal a matter of indifference. But to many thousands the cost of coal is a pretty big item in the year's expenditure. And the King thought of this. He took note also that among thousands the cooking stove, which

was also the sole heater in many a working man's household, gave out too much heat in summer and barely enough in winter. There was a big waste of coal and much discomfort from heat in the summer cooking. Hence his invention, which provides for shutting off one half the fire box and one half the oven by simply pressing a lever. The patent stove thus does its work on half rations of coal, and prevents the cook and the family from being roasted along with the beef in the hot days of midsummer. When colder weather comes the lever can be shifted back and the stove can be run at full power.

Now we must bear in mind that the King is one of the busiest men in the Empire. In fact he works like an editor—always at it! What with the Coronation and the Indian Durbar, seeing that the navy is kept up to the two-power standard, keeping in touch with brother Monarchs and Presidents, receiving royal visits, studying up the Morocco question, the Turkish-Italian, Persian and Chinese questions, opening Parliament and perusing its daily doings, holding the scales between Asquith and Bonar Law, between Tariff Reformers and Home Rulers, with an eye, too, on the striking miners and the militant Suffragettes, he must be a very busy man indeed. And with all these things to consider and deal with he took thought of the comfort of and economy of the working man in his cottage and how fuel might be saved.

Improved stoves and sleeve-links! After all the royal minds that take thought of such things as these are possessed of the true secret of statecraft, which is to keep in touch and sympathy with the people. The throne has in every loyal subject a prop to give it greater stability. The King, whose motto as Prince of Wales had been "I serve," is still in his higher station the servant as well as the father of his people. His invention and that of the German Crown Prince, too, come in touch with the people and will both interest and be of service to the masses. The fuel-saving stove is of the more timely interest now that coal is at famine prices in England. And is it not better that the inventive faculties of the King of Britain and the Crown Prince of Germany should be devoted to such peaceful and useful appliances, than to devising deadly instruments by which the two great nations might destroy each other? We think it is better, and not the less dignified or royal.

SOME URGENT QUESTIONS

The due enforcement of the prohibitory law is and will continue to be a matter of vital interest to the people of this Province. By overwhelming majorities at repeated plebiscites they called for the enactment of this law. So strong has been the public feeling in favor of the principle of prohibition that both parties in the Legislature united to pass it, and since united to amend and strengthen it by unanimous votes. We recall these facts by reason of a recent conviction in the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court in the City of Charlottetown.

John Burns, an appointed vendor under the Act has been repeatedly convicted and fined before the late Stipendiary and the present one for violation by illegal sale. In a recent case the information was laid for a second offence. The offence was clearly proved. The Magistrate made the conviction for a first offence. A good many people want to know why this was done. And they also want to know why a vendor thus repeatedly convicted is retained in office. These questions seem to be vital and urgent.

NOTES

A movement is on foot to celebrate the Centenary of Sir George Cartier in Montreal in 1914. Sir George was a most interesting and striking figure in Canadian affairs. He was born in 1814 and in comparatively early life shared in the revolt led by Papineau. Later he came into political life and rose by his ability to become Premier of old Canada in 1858. Without his co-operation the Confederation of 1867 to which he lent his aid, would have been impossible. Sir George was a great French Canadian, a man of broad and tolerant spirit, devoted to the welfare of Canada. His monument stands among those of the great men of Canada on Parliament Hill at Ottawa. The present movement is to erect another monument in Montreal, the scene of his residence and activities.

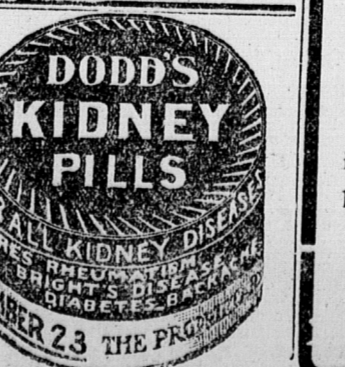
