ANOTHER NEW HOSPITAL.-The Dominion Coal Company are to build a new hospital at Glace Bay, C. B., according to plans made by Mr. C. B. Chappell, of Charlottetown. The construction of the hospital is to be proceeded with at once and finished by the first of the new year. It is to be of brick and stone, 180 feet long by 50 feet wide, and three stories in height. There will be accommodation for 40 beds in the public wards, besides ten private rooms. It will have all modern improvements, the arrangements throughout being similar to those of the new P. E. Island Hospital. The cost will be in the vicinity of \$25,000.
