Fortune-Teller's Almanac.

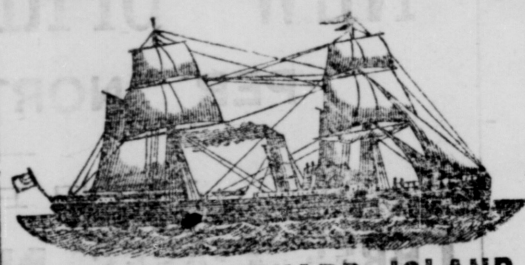

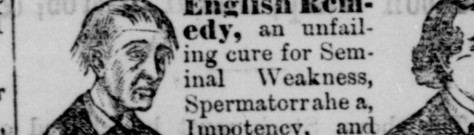
