YESTERDAY'S INSPECTION.

The Artillery Make an Excellent Showing.

Yesterday was a day of very great interest to the officers and men of the 4th Regiment, Canadian Artillery. It was their inspection day at Victoria Park. Nos. 4 and 5 Companies, from Souris and Montague, respectively, which have been in camp for the past ten days, were marched to the drill shed at 8 o'clock in the morning where they were inspected in gun drill by Lieut. Colonel Moore, District Officer Commanding. Each company furnished two detachments each on 40-pound R. B. L., and 64 pound R. M. L. guns. The gun drill was of a very high order which, under the circumstances, demonstrates that our young men possess military instincts capable of being highly developed. Captains Leslie and Johnstone are justly proud of these two fine rifle companies and are to be complimented on the excellence of their work.

At 2.30 p.m. the whole regiment paraded at the park for inspection. It was drawn up in line under command of Major Davison and received the inspecting officer (the D. O. C.) with a general salute. The regiment formed quarter column by the right and marched past in column by the right and quarter column by the left. Line was again formed on the original alignment and was then advanced in review order. The marching of the men during these movements was such as to call forth the hearty encomiums of the spectators.

The companies were put through manual and firing exercises, and company drill, by the company officers, and it was as fine an exhibition of drill as has ever been witnessed on Victoria Park.

The city companies were then marched to the drill shed where they were inspected in gun drill (40 pound and 64 pound). Here also the men gave evidence of careful training. Indeed, the manner in which they handled the big guns would have done no discredit to the R. C. A., or any other permanent force. After what we witnessed yesterday we can readily understand the remark of the Imperial officer, at Cape Town, in reference to the Canadian Artillery when he said, "they are very fit and can learn nothing from Imperial Horse Artillery." The inspecting officer, Colonel Moore, who was at one time commanding officer of this regiment, expressed himself as being very highly pleased with the efficiency of his old command.

Owing to the unavoidable absence of Lieut.-Colonel Longworth, Major Davison commanded the regiment, and acquitted himself in such a manner as only an efficient soldier can.

The brigade band, which has recently been re-organized under the leadership of bandmaster M. M. Galbraith, was present and enlivened the proceedings with their excellent music. This regiment is also to be congratulated on having the services of Staff-Instructor Sutherland, R. C. A., Quebec. Instructor Sutherland has been on the Island for some weeks and it must be a source of pride to him to see the men, many of whom were recruits, acquit themselves so well. If he performs all his duties with as much zeal as he has thrown into Brighton Camp there is no doubt but that at the close of it he will go "up"—"up."

THE EXAMINER tenders Lieutenant-Colonel Longworth its congratulations on yesterday's inspection. He possesses the respect and confidence of his officers and men in a remarkable manner, which, no doubt, accounts for the excellent esprit de corps of the regiment, which is officered as under:

I am surprised to find the Queen looking so well and so young. From her kindly, bright, clear eyes one would never have thought she had attained the age she has."

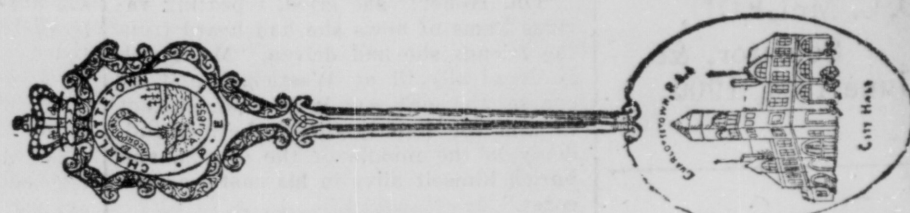
OLD M'GILL.
