

Nobel Prizes Awarded To Three Russians, Briton

STOCKHOLM (AP) — Three Russian nuclear scientists won the Nobel Prize in Physics Tuesday. The prize for chemistry went to Dr. Frederick Sanger, 40, of Britain, for work on insulin.

The Russians are P. A. Cherenkov, I. M. Frank and Igor E. Tamm, all Moscow professors. They were cited jointly for their work with high speed, subatomic particles. One product of their research was a cosmic ray counter. One such counter now is orbiting the earth in Russia's Sputnik III.

Now the Kremlin must decide what to do about it. It has already brought down its wrath on the Nobel Prize committee for choosing author Boris Pasternak as the winner of the literature prize.

Pasternak wrote "Doctor Zhivago," a novel critical of communism and the Soviet revolution. The book has not been published in Russia, but is widely read in the West.

CALLED A TOOL

The Soviet press has called Pasternak a tool of those who would fan the cold war. It demanded that he reject the \$41,420 Nobel cash prize.

It is obvious the Kremlin does not want him to attend the presentation ceremonies in Stockholm Dec. 12.

On the other hand, Cherenkov, Frank and Tamm are among the scientific elite in Russia and are

the first Soviet nuclear scientists ever to receive a Nobel citation. The Kremlin, proud of Soviet scientific achievements, would like to have them recognized.

CAN HE GO?

But the question arises whether the Kremlin can let the three scientists attend the presentation ceremonies for their \$41,420 cash prize while keeping Pasternak home.

The citation recognized the scientists "for the discovery and interpretation of the Cherenkov effect." It said the discovery of the effect was initiated by the researches of Cherenkov and carried on by the theorists, Frank and Tamm.

The "Cherenkov effect" is the phenomenon that light is emitted from an electron or other electrically charged particle which moves in a medium with a velocity greater than that of light in the medium.

Ch'town Council Will Give Federal Plan Close Study

Chairman of the Street Committee of the City Council, Frank O'Neill, said last night that the council would give "a close and extensive study" to the recently announced federal plan to help receive unemployment in municipalities across Canada during the winter months.

It is expected that the matter will be brought up at a special meeting of the council scheduled this evening at 7 p.m.

Mr. O'Neill stated that usually no special projects are planned during the winter but the proposed offer "will certainly change the thinking of the City Council."

"In the normal course, no extraordinary winter projects had been planned as the winter season here usually precludes ordinary street work," he stated and added, "However, the announcement yesterday of 50 per cent federal assistance on municipal projects to provide winter work will certainly change the thinking of the City Council."

"The proposition will be given close and extensive study at an early date to arrive at a program that will not only ease the winter unemployment situation to some extent but also promote portions of projects contemplated for next spring."

The federal program was announced Monday night at Regina by Prime Minister Diefenbaker. Meant as a direct means of relieving unemployment, the plans call for the federal government to bear the burden of 50 per cent of the labor costs by any municipal project that would not normally be done during the winter months.

It will come into effect December to April.

Island Red Cross Disaster Teams Help At Springhill

Twice since last Thursday's mine disaster at Springhill, Red Cross Disaster Teams from P.E.I. have spent 24 hour periods at Springhill. Mr. Bruce MacLaren was member of the first team, while Miss Iphigene Arsenault and Miss Wayne MacDonald accompanied the second team both of which were headed by Mrs. J. Gordon MacDonald, Provincial Chairman of Red Cross Disaster Services.

While at Springhill, the team worked on meals with representatives of the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Divisions of Red Cross from the Red Cross Disaster Headquarters which has been set up in the Baptist Church Hall. They assisted in applying emergency food and clothing to the draegermen and bare-faced miners.

Officials of the Springhill Red Cross Branch have been continuously on duty at the Red Cross Disaster Headquarters, along with Red Cross personnel from different centres in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island for whom sleeping accommodation and meals have been provided through the thoughtfulness and generosity of several women of Springhill.

The Red Cross Team was very much impressed with the indomitable spirit not only of the rescuers but of the residents of Springhill for the courageous manner in which they are bearing up under their third disaster in two years.

St. Dunstan's Credit Union Shows Ninety New Members

"Ninety new members have been added to St. Dunstan's Baseline Credit Union during the past year," declared Dr. J.C. Murphy in his presidential report at the annual meeting held at the Holy Name Hall last night.

This represented a substantial increase not only over the number of new members each year for the past several years, he said, but also significantly increased the total membership.

"This is a healthy condition," he continued, "and explains in large measure the continued success of the St. Dunstan's Credit Union." Only through the continued interest of the members would the future growth and development of the Credit Union be assured, he maintained.

ADDED INCENTIVE

In the course of his presidential address, Dr. Murphy announced that the maximum amount of shareholdings per member eligible for insurance through CUNA was increased from \$1000 to \$2000. This, he considered should provide an added incentive for members to increase their savings deposits with the Credit Union.

The financial report was presented by the Treasurer, Leo F. MacDonald. The report showed shares totalling \$145,537.85; personal loans of \$98,057.13; mortgage loans of \$38,427.17; investments of \$25,159.10 and net earnings for the past year of \$3,462.81. Assets total \$162,456.06.

Mr. George Chervic, President of the P.E.I. Credit Union League and a National Director of CUNA, spoke briefly to the members regarding the setting up of a Stabilization Fund for orderly liquidation of Credit Unions, and the development of the Share and Loan Department of the League.

The report of the Credit Committee was presented by Mr. Wendell Mullins, and the report of the Supervisory Committee was given by Miss Anna J. MacInnis.

Appointed to the Board of Directors were Rt. Rev. P. McMahon, Edmond Arsenault, Alan F. MacDonald and Leo F. MacDonald. Arthur F. MacInnis and Alfred E. Coady were elected to the Supervisory Committee, and W.W. Mullins, Wendell Murphy, Gerald Driscoll and Joseph Tierney were appointed on the Credit Committee.

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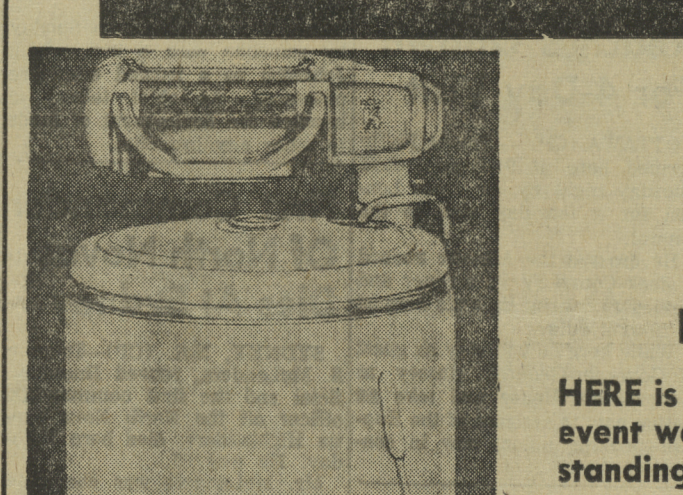

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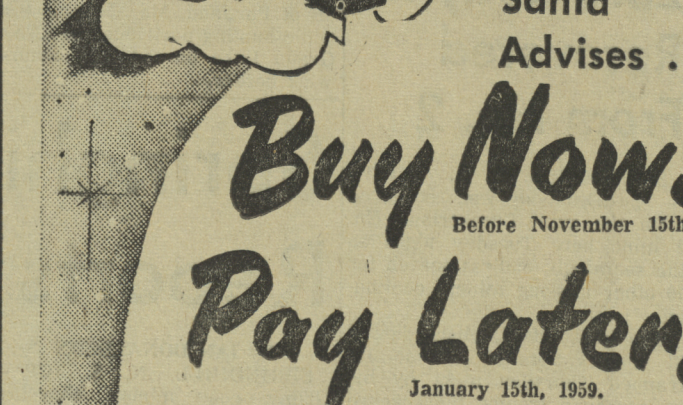
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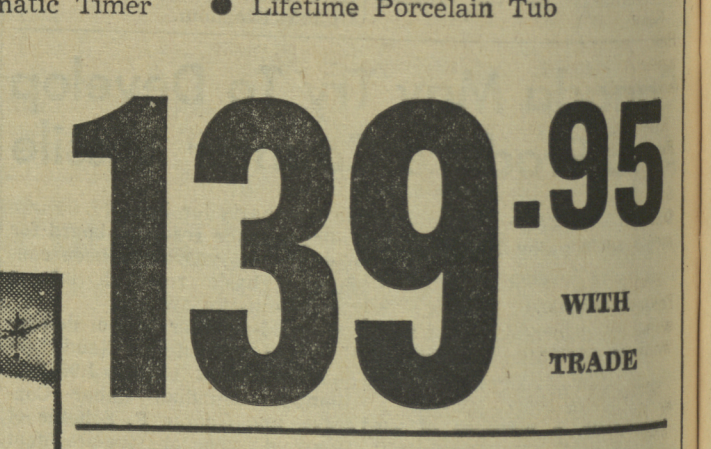
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
