Frauds on Pie-Eaters.

A man who has recently visited a pie factory in Chicago thus describes it:—"The day we were there a special run was being made on pumpkin pies, and I looked in vain for any signs of pumpkin rinds. One of the foremen grinned and told me, in strict confidence, that real pumpkin was never used in pumpkin pies at present, except possibly in a few remote and very primitive New England villages. The substitute was a mixture of sweet potatoes, apples and cheap flour, flavored with a chemical extract. I tasted some of the stuff and was satisfied he was telling me the truth. Cranberry pie contains only enough cranberries to "make a showing," after the manner of the oyster in the church fair stew. The rest is apple jelly, colored red and flavored. I have forgotten the other substitutes employed, but these will give you a general idea of the morality of the business. The average output of the foundry was one a second, or about thirty-six thousand pies for a working day. The manager told me they were shipped all over the pie belt in specially prepared crates"

IN A SOLDIER'S GRAVE.

Funeral of the Late Prince Christian Victor an Interesting Ceremony.

The funeral of Prince Christian Victor, a grandson of the Queen, who died at Pretoria from enteric fever, took place there on the 8th inst. Minute guns began firing at 10 a. m., when the cortege left the Yeomanry hospital, and continued during the funeral. The route was lined with a guard of honor consisting of the men of the Norfolks and Hants regiments. Representatives of all the forces were present, including detachments of the colonial troops, mounted infantry, cavalry, artillery, and the medical and army service corps. The bands of the Norfolk and Hants regiments played Chopin's "Dead March." The Second Coldstreams immediately preceded the gun-carriage bearing the body. The pall bearers were all generals—General Roberts, Prince Francis of Teck, General Kitchener, and ail of Genera. Roberts' staff present in Pretoria followed the body. At the cathedral, Rev. Mr. Rose, chaplain of the Australians, received the body, which was taken into the church. The chief mourners and a number of the ordinary congregation filled the building. The service was choral. Rev. Mr. Cox, the chaplain of the Canadians, read the lesson. Rev. Mr. Wilson, the senior chaplain at Pretoria, and other clergy were present. After the services at the church the procession reformed in church square, and marched to the cemetery, a mile west of the town. A large number of the residents looked on as the procession passed. Some of them reverently bared their heads as the body went by, but others were conspicuously indifferent, standing in doorways with their hats on.

Upon arriving at the cemetery, the Coldstream Guards halted and lined the path to the grave, standing with their rifles pointed to the ground, and with heads bent. At the grave, Rev. Mr. Maurice, Rev. Mr. Jones and Rev. Mr. Mulineau conducted the burial service. The Guards then fired a royal salute, which was followed by three volleys over the grave. The Queen sent a wreath of lilies and carnations. Another beautiful wreath bore a card inscribed "From His Mother." Other wreaths were sent by Lord and Lady Rober's, Prince Francis of Teck, the officers of the King's Royal Rifles, General Maxwell, and Governor S. Alfred Milner. The coffin was inscribed:

MAJOR, HIS HIGHNESS, PRINCE CHRISTIAN VICTOR OF SCHLESWIG-HOLSTEIN.

Of the King's Royal Rifles,
 Died October 29, 1900,
 At Rest.

The Prince was buried here by the Queen's command, she desiring to fulfill his own express wish. The scene at the grave was very impressive. The Prince is buried close to the graves of many of the soldiers who fell here.

Burns' Cottage.
