

Island Open Tourney On Belvedere Greens

Professional and Amateur golfers from approximately 35 clubs in five provinces and three States have started to drift into Charlottetown for the thirteenth edition of the Prince Edward Island Open Golf Tourney to be played on the 6370 yard Belvedere Golf and Winter Club Course.

In all there are over 225 entries in the tourney and Stan Bryanton chairman of the P.E.I. Open Committee stated that "There are more pros in attendance this year than in any past year that I can recall". The entries this year were restricted to 225 golfers due to the heavy numbers of entries received last season. Due to the restriction on the entries the tournament committee feels that this will be a wide open tourney because there are so many players with low handicaps. There will be prizes up for grabs in eight different divisions. Professional Championship, Senior, Junior, first, second, third and fourth.

Sentimental favorite to take both the professional and championship divisions will be Cecil "Bobby" Dowling, the local club pro who has come back this season after four unsuccessful years. He recently captured top honors in the Bathurst Open and was topped by Jack Munroe in the Lakeside Lobster Tourney held in Moncton last weekend. However he will be well pushed as practically every touring pro in the Maritimes will be in attendance including Ron LeClair of Poland Springs, U.S.A., who won the title in 1964 and who another favorite this year.

Play will get underway at 7:00 a.m. Saturday morning. Following a schedule of the P.E.I. Open Golf Tournament to be held Saturday and Sunday, August 27 and 28, at the Belvedere Golf and Winter Club.

Lions' Capozzi Resigns; To Enter B.C. Politics

VANCOUVER (CP) - Harold Peter (Herb) Capozzi, relinquished one career Wednesday in order to search for another in B.C. Lions of the Western Football Conference formally announced Capozzi had resigned as general manager, effective Dec. 31, the end of the CFL season.

The resignation followed Capozzi's nomination Thursday as Social Credit candidate in Vancouver Centre constituency in the Sept. 12 B.C. election. The nomination came the night Lions lost 11-7 to Winnipeg.

Capozzi's first attempt at provincial politics, Lions' players in 1963 nicknamed him "senator" as he campaigned for election on the Social Credit ticket in North Vancouver's two-seat riding in B.C.'s last general election.

He and his running-mate, F. M. Sharp lost to B.C. Liberal Leader Ray Errault and veteran Liberal MLA Gordon Gibson.

Kelowna-born Capozzi, now 41 and the father of three, has had a varied career. He graduated with first class honors in sciences in obtaining a bachelor of arts degree from the University of B.C. in 1947.

The next year UBC granted him a degree in commerce and then he went to Italy on a fellowship grant for two years.

He later played football with both Calgary Stampeders and Montreal Alouettes.

He has also been a laboratory assistant at UBC, involved in research analysis, personnel and public relations with Shell Oil Co., Calgary, a program director for Montreal television station CBMT, and director of Italian service for the CBC's international service.
