

## Native Dancer Wins Handicap

NEW YORK (AP) — Native Dancer staged a breathtaking matinee thriller Saturday when he came from far behind to defeat Straight Face by a neck to win the \$39,200 Metropolitan Handicap at Belmont Park.

Any doubts of the Dancer's greatness were wiped away as Alfred Vanderbilt's four-year-old, backed down to 1 to 4, finished with his characteristic late rush to finish the mile in 1:35 1-5 while carrying 130 pounds. That is just 23 of a second slower than the track record set by Count Fleet in 1942 when he was a two-year-old and had only 116 pounds.

The Dancer also equaled another, older record, Man o' War's proud mark of 20 victories in 21 starts.

The favored Dancer, making his first start in a handicap and carrying the heaviest weight of his career, raced far back of the leaders in the nine-horse field until near the finish. With an eighth of a mile remaining he trailed Straight Face by 3 1/2 lengths.

## Fluoridation Is Recommended

TORONTO (CP)—The Canadian Society of Dentistry for Children Saturday recommended fluoridation as a means of attacking tooth decay.

At the annual meeting of the society endorsed the following resolution:

"The Canadian Society of Dentistry for Children recommends that areas in Canada having access to community water supplies adopt a procedure of water fluoridation in accordance with the local need, following receipt of competent dental, medical and engineering advice."

A panel consisting of Drs. S. A. MacGregor, Armacost Cox, Gordon Nikiforuk, Wesley J. Dunk and R. L. Scott, said community fluoridation is much the cheapest and

safest way to prevent tooth decay in children.

The average child costs his parents about \$26 each year in dental care, the doctors said, while community fluoridation costs about 10 cents a person a year.

Dr. S. A. MacGregor, dental department chief, Toronto Hospital for Sick Children, pointed out the need for an educated approach to the eating of sugar by children.

He said fluoridation will help prevent tooth decay in about two-thirds of children.

## McCarthy Plans Foreign Policy Speech Soon

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Senator Joseph McCarthy (Rep.-Wis.) said Sunday he is drafting a foreign policy speech which may be delivered on the Senate floor before he takes the witness stand—perhaps late this week—in his fight with army officials.

McCarthy would say only that he plans to discuss American policy in Asia, but some of his friends said the speech may be the prelude to a double-barreled attack on top Republican as well as Democratic critics.

While McCarthy has seemed subdued in recent days as army counsel John G. Adams testified in Senate sub-committee hearings that the senator and his aides sought favors for Pte. G. David Schine, friends said McCarthy has been boiling inside at what he regards as signs that Eisenhower administration officials are out to

get his political scalp.

They said McCarthy's apparent conclusion was reached on the basis of disclosures that Sherman Adams, White House chief of staff, Attorney General Herbert Brownell Jr., and Henry Cabot Lodge, ambassador to the United Nations, sat in on a Jan. 21 conference which started the chain of events leading to the army's formal charges against McCarthy and his staff.

John Adams testified that Sherman Adams suggested that he (John Adams) put down in writing the alleged incidents of pressure being brought to bear by McCarthy and his aides. Roy M. Cohn and Francis P. Carr. From this chronology of alleged events grew the army's formal charges.

John Adams is under orders from chairman Karl Mundt (Rep.-S.D.) to produce before the subcommittee today a written version of the oral order he said he had received advising him not to disclose any new details of the Jan. 21 meeting.

McCarthy has demanded the "complete story" of that meeting, since at least one of those who sat in on it—deputy attorney-general William P. Rogers—has served in

## Gives Report On Alcoholism

TORONTO (CP)—A medical authority on alcoholism Saturday told a group of 250 dentists that satisfactory recovery from dependence on alcohol can be expected in 67 to 75 per cent of patients if the treatment is clinically sound.

Dr. R. Gordon Bell, medical director, Shadow Brook health foundation, an institution for treatment of those addicted to alcohol, said "some heavy drinkers reject treatment because they think it may mean depriving themselves of alcohol for life."

"They would be much more interested if they would realize that, with care, they might be able to use alcohol in reasonable doses," said Dr. Bell in an address to the Society of Dentistry for Children.

"Keep on the way they're going and they're in danger of acquiring a disease that will make further use of alcohol, on a controlled level, impossible."

Alcoholics who have reached the state where alcohol is poisonous to the point of breakdown "must be taught to shift their dependence into another area—to a person, or a group, as with Alcoholics Anonymous or clinical specialists..." said Dr. Bell.

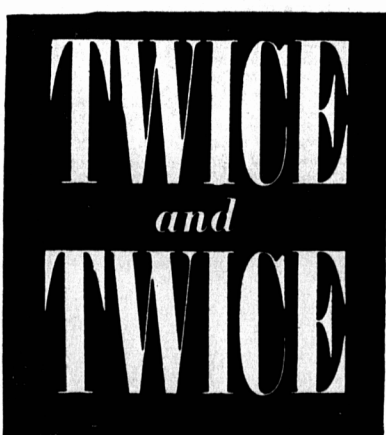
