

McQuaid Orders Yield Signs Down

The department of highways was ordered by Attorney General Melvin McQuaid to take down all "yield right-of-way" signs on provincial highways.

The Attorney-General said that to avoid confusion on the part of motorists who are approaching an intersection where yield signs normally are placed, he will recommend that stop signs be erected as a temporary measure.

"This amendment," he said, "cannot be introduced until the next session of the Legislature. In my opinion, until the amendment is passed, these yield signs constitute a danger to traffic, and should be removed from the roads."
