AT THE ORDERLY ROOMS.

A WARNING TO OTHERS.—Three young lads went out sailing on a cake of ice this morning off the park. After they had been enjoying themselves in this way for some time the cake broke and two of them fell into the water. Fortunately for them their predicament was observed by some people on one of the wharves and a boat put out to their assistance. The lads were pretty well exhausted by the time the boat reached them, and each of the three got a bad scare. These lads will likely be wary of ice-cake sailing in the future. It is hoped that their providential escape will be a warning to other lads similarly inclined.

McGILL UNIVERSITY.—According to a supplementary circular issued by McGill University, Montreal, a competition will be held, beginning on Thursday, September 15th, for twenty exhibitions for students entering the first year, as follows: Two Exhibitions of \$200 each; Two Exhibitions of \$120; One Exhibition of \$100 (open to women only) One Exhibition of \$90; and twelve Exhibitions of \$60 each. The twelve Exhibitions of sixty dollars each are open for competition to residents in any part of Canada except the Island of Montreal. All the other Exhibitions are open to general competition without such limitation.

ISLAND FREIGHT RATES.—The Moncton Times says: It is understood that on traffic manager Harris orders, a new set of freight tariffs for the Prince Edward Island Railway is in course of preparation in the general offices here. The new rates will be very much higher than those heretofore in force and it is unlikely that the Island people will submit to the imposition without protest. We may expect therefore to see a disturbance of business in the district served by the Is and road similar to that caused in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia by the new tariff on the Intercolonial. A bye-election is now pending in West Prince, and it is unlikely that the new tariff will be issued until after polling day. It is as well, however, to warn the Island public of what is coming.
