



Bay State Pat Sweeps Invitation Pace Before Capacity Crowd Saturday Night

Junior Abbies Smother Intermediates 16-5 Sunday

The Junior Abbies trained their batting eyes on the faraway fences at Memorial Field Sunday afternoon and blasted three intermediate pitchers out of the box in a brief 5-inning baseball contest to win going away 16-5.

The bay gelding won all three heats in typical Bay State Pat style, but failed by 1 7/10 seconds to crack the track mark of 2:05 1/2 set by Bud Wenger 19 years ago.

Bay State Pat left the wire in the first two heats in his usual position—dead last—and began his drive in the second half that took him to the head of the pack at the three-quarter pole and a winner under the wire.

In a final bid for the track record MacGregor got the gelding up with the field in the third heat but had to settle for third position most of the way around. However, at the finish line Bay State Pat emerged on top again over Joseadale Clansman, who led the field up to the three-quarter pole.

Josedale Double Hal showed in the first and third heats and Jerry's Nightmare in the middle canto, while Handbook and Sir Joseph placed in the first and second heats.

Bay State Pat's times were 2:08, 2:07.1 and 2:07.2.

Eva Budlong split heats with Lila Grey in the first of the classified races. Eva was followed to the wire by Jean B. Lee and Volon in the first heat and Eva Budlong and Volon copped place and show in the second mile.

Abner McGraw was an upset winner over Bell Banks and Suffolk Chief in the first heat of the third classified pace but had to settle for second in the final heat behind the Banks mare, with Queen Primrose taking third.

After a great stretch drive Faraway Lady won the first dash of the second classified pace over Lou Kalmuck and Marion E. with the favorites Laurel Chief and Miss Judy Hal trailing in fourth and sixth positions. Faraway Lady was overtaken at the wire in the final dash by Lou Kalmuck and Marion E. again showed.

Faraway Lady and Eva Budlong were the only two horses on the night to lower their marks. Faraway Lady from 2:16.3 to 2:14 and Eva Budlong from 2:13.1 to 2:13.

Philadelphia's improved Phillies inflicted the third straight defeat upon Brooklyn Dodgers Sunday to trim the Brooks' once awesome first place National League lead over Milwaukee to 11 games.

While the Phils were making a sweep of the three-game set from the Dodgers 6-4, the Braves were making it three in a row over Chicago with an 8-1 triumph. Milwaukee has now won five straight while the Dodgers have dropped five of their last six.

The tight four-team American League race showed no sign of slackening off as all four contenders triumphed. New York Yankees whipped Baltimore for the third straight time 6-1 to retain their slim hold on first place.

The American League pennant race Saturday as the three leaders each won.

Chapman Wins Jr. Tennis Title

OTTAWA (CP)—Smith Chapman of Montreal won the Canadian junior men's tennis title Saturday, the first Canadian-born player to do so in the seven years of Canadian junior tennis championships.

But a 15-year-old blonde bombshell, Phyllis Szaganski of Hamtramck, Mich., took home four crowns in the championships which ended here Saturday.

Chapman defeated Francis Goddout of Waterloo, Que., 9-7, 2-6, 6-1, 6-1 in the first all-Canadian final of the tournament's history. Earlier in the week he won the closed junior men's title, competed for by Canadians only.

Arnold Palmer Winner Of Canadian Golf Ch'ship

WESTON, Ont. (CP)—Arnold Palmer, comparative neophyte on the pro golf circuit, pulled himself together Saturday like a veteran and marched off with the Canadian open golf championship and \$2,400.

Only a year after he won the U.S. amateur title, the 25-year-old Latrobe, Pa., golfer squelched a threatened blow-up on the second front nine of the final round. He finished the 72-hole distance with a 265 medal score, 23 strokes under the Weston club's par.

His two-under-par 70 on his final round was Palmer's poorest of the tournament. He admitted he was "really scrambling for that one."

Three Montaque teen-age girls and a youth almost completed the swim from Montaque to Georgetown yesterday afternoon. Those making the close bid were Judy Cudmore, 14; Maxine MacLeod, 15; Pauline Murphy, 15; and Harry Stewart, 14. They were accompanied all the way by their swimming instructor, Miss Winnie MacPherson, 18, of Charlottetown.

One swimmer, Peter DesRoches left the water after a considerable distance, but the five others continued to Clements Point at Lower Montaque where Stewart was forced to leave the water because of a cramp. The four girls continued on across the river to Brudenell Point, and there they decided not to go to Georgetown. The instructor then got in one of the boats, and accompanied the three girls who swam the river once more to Clements Cove, about the same distance remaining to have arrived at Georgetown.

"We would have made it easily," the young girls said, and indeed when they came out of the water at Clements Cove they still did not seem to be very tired.

The six swimmers entered the water at Montaque at 2:20 p.m. and left the water at 6:30, swimming about seven miles in the strong-current river. The distance between Montaque and Georgetown in a relatively straight line is somewhat over five miles. They were accompanied by two

The 18-year-old speedster covered the 100-yards in 11.3 seconds, 3.5 of a second off the existing Canadian women's mark. Unofficially she tied the Canadian mark in July at Moncton, but this has not been recognized.

In the 220-yard, Diane covered the distance in 25.2 seconds for what meet officials believe is a new Maritime mark.

Found 18-Mile Lake Swim Tough

WINNIPEG (CP)—A Winnipeg swimmer who conquered Lake Winnipeg Friday in 18-mile swim from Grand Marais to Winnipeg beach said Saturday she felt she was quitting every mile along the 18-mile of the course.

"These last 10 miles were as tough as Kathie Mcintosh," she said, who made the swim in just under 17 hours to win more than \$1,000 in prizes.

She was exhausted when she waded ashore Friday night but a physician who examined her later said she suffered no ill effects.

Steele Wins Mile Run

TORONTO (CP)—The track was perfect, the wind negligible. But it was too hot to run a four-minute mile.

Wes Santee of the United States led the distance in four minutes 11.1 seconds, finishing with a fast 57-second last quarter in scorching 95-degree heat Saturday to win over fellow-countryman Fred Dwyer and Britain's Gordon Pirie. The result reversed a decision at White City Stadium, London, where Pirie defeated Santee in 1953.

Saturday, Pirie and Dwyer were both clocked at 4:13.2. Dwyer, who appeared to let up at the end, to take second place.

Swaps Cops American Derby

CHICAGO (AP)—Sensational Swaps, leading all the way but never by more than 2 1/2 lengths, spurred to a one-length victory over the fast-closing traffic Friday Saturday to win the \$146,425 American Derby.

Reck C. Ellsworth's chestnut colt, making his debut on the grass course, covered the 1 3/16 mile distance in a record-matching time of 1:54.35. It equaled the American turf mark recently set by Platan in the Arlington Handicap.

The Eskimos trailed Calgary until the final five minutes, when Normie Kwong went over for a major to give them a 13-10 win.

The Roughriders scored two touchdowns in the first three minutes against a disjointed Winnipeg squad to delight 13,500 hometown fans.
