The Trade Question

Reciprocity to be Discussed.

Delegates Leave for Washington.

OTTAWA, Feb. 9. Sir John Thompson, Hon. Mr. Foster and Hon. Mr. B. Wells, accompanied by Mr. Pattee, Assistant Commissioner of Customs, left for Washington yesterday. Previous to their departure, they attended a meeting of the cabinet. But the Premier was absent, being confined to his house by a severe cold. Bowell, as senior privy councillor, presided at the session, which lasted an hour. Then Sir John Thompson and two other ministers had a lengthy interview with the Governor-General, who came up to town specially to meet them. It is understood that the informal discussion will be confined altogether to the trade question.

The New York Life.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9. President Beers has resigned the Presidency of the New York Life Insurance Co. He will retain the position of an adviser at a salary of \$37,500. A telegram to A. A. McLean, Esq. the agent in this city, from Mr. Burke, the General Manager at Montreal, reports: "President Beers to-day tendered his resignation to the Board of Trustees of the New York Life Insurance Co., which was accepted by the Board, with the condition that he should remain with the Company in an advisory capacity the remainder of his life. His successor will be elected on the 10th inst."

Court of Chancery.

TUESDAY, Feb. 9. The Master of the Rolls presiding. The Queen vs. Phelan. The Master of the Rolls delivered judgment in this case this morning, discharging the prisoner from jail under the warrant of commitment issued by Fredk. Horne and John A. McDonald, two Justices of the Peace, for a breach of the second part of the Canada Temperance Act. His Lordship reviewed the provisions of the Canada Temperance Act and the Summary Convictions Act at great length, and held that there was no power given to the magistrates to impose the costs of conveying the prisoner to jail, and that this was imposing a greater penalty than was authorized by the Canada Temperance Act, and therefore could not be amended under the provisions of the latter Act.

The Queen vs. Patrick Doyle. Like decision. The Queen vs. James Stewart. Same decision. All the prisoners being in Court in charge of the jailer, they were discharged, and the Court adjourned.

Supreme Court.

TUESDAY, Feb. 9. The Hilary session of the Supreme Court was resumed this forenoon, the three judges being present. Joseph Wise vs. Janet McKinnon.—An action of detainer tried Trinity term last, when a verdict was entered for the plaintiff. A rule nisi for non suit was granted and argued same term, when judgment was reserved. The Chief Justice this morning gave judgment, making the rule for non suit absolute. Mr. Justice Hodgson concurred. Henry Burke vs. Henry Boyver.—Argued in Chambers. Mr. Justice Hensley this morning gave judgment dismissing the application of the Credit Foncier Franco Canadian for moneys in the hands of the Sheriff. McKenna vs. Fisk.—Action of trespass. Tried Trinity term last, when verdict was given in favor of the defendant. A rule nisi for a new trial to-day being argued. Morson for plaintiff; Arthur Peters for defendant.
