Throughout the entire week the farmers of the Island will be in competition with each other in the show ring. The finest dairy and beef cattle of the best of the Island's famed hogs, many varieties and types of sheep will parade before the expert judges who will award the ribbons in each class. The President of the Charlottetown Driving Club and Exhibition Dr. J.P. Lantz, and the manager of the Show Mr. H.J. Kennedy have both had wide experience in farming and in the breeding of prize cattle. Because of the interest of these men in the island's chief industry and the support of several other directors of the Exhibition Association, the important position that agriculture has always held in the Exhibition programme has not been allowed to diminish, and every effort is made each year to see that its prominence remains pre-eminent. This year is no exception, and the crowded livestock barns, now open to inspection, is testimony to the high degree of efficiency reached by island farmers.

By THE CANADIAN PRESS Sunday's crash of a Maritime Central Airways DC-4 passenger plane near Quebec City was Canada's worst aircraft accident. All 79 persons aboard were killed.

Canada's worst previous toll was in the crash of a Trans-Canada Air Lines plane in British Columbia Dec. 9, 1956, in which 62 persons died.
