The ceremony was privately performed at the residence of the bride, No. 76 Queen street, by the Rev. Mr. Cross, of the German street Baptist Church. The happy couple left the city by the "Flying Yankee," on their way to Portland, from whence they go on a visit to Worcester and through the Eastern States. They will return to St. John in about ten days time, and will stay at the Royal Hotel, where they will receive the congratulations of their numerous friends. Mrs. Thomson's family will accompany the bride to Halifax. PROF. J. HERSCHEL SMITH AT LITTLE YORK.—This gentleman made his first appearance as a public instructor here on Friday evening. Some curiosity was excited about his abilities as he was described on the handbills as both talented, brilliant and popular. Then the bill of fare was both full and varied, French and Scotch songs, an essay on his Satanic majesty, and music, were some of the chief attractions offered. The professor's voice proved to be very husky from a severe cold recently caught, and the organette was slightly rheumatic in its movements, and consequently somewhat jerky in its notes. However, though the audience was not burdened with anything very learned or dry, it managed to enjoy itself fairly well. SAIL DROWNING ACCIDENT.—A very sad drowning accident occurred in the East River, a little below the old foundry, on Wednesday afternoon, by which two men, Joseph Huggins and Joseph Plussinger, lost their lives. They were two of the Bohemian glass-blowers brought here last spring, unmarried, and aged respectively nineteen and twenty-five. It appears that the men took a boat which filled with water. They jumped and fell out, having hold of each other while struggling in the water. A countryman of their standing on the shore called to them to separate, and then swam out to assist them. They caught him by the feet, but his shoes being loose came off, which probably saved his life. The bodies were recovered close together after being in the water two hours.—Pictou News. A FISHERMAN'S SEVERE SUFFERING.—A sailor has been forwarded from St. John by the American Consul there, to his home at Gloucester, Mass. While on the passage he told the following story: It seems the sailor and his chum were off the Banks in their dory setting traps. The fog shut down on them and they were unable to find their vessel. On the second day a storm came on and it was only by a miracle they managed to keep from capsizing. The storm abated the third day and then began to rain. They had then a drop of water or a bit of bread. The fog was continually lifting and shutting down. At times they would see vessels and halt them and then the fog would thicken down around them, dispelling all hopes of rescue. The desire for water amounted to fearful torture, and it is probable the dampness that saturated their clothes was all that kept them alive. As it was the sailor's comrade became delirious. On the fifth day a vessel managed to rescue them and carried them into St. John.—Bangor Whig.
