

Lemon Wins 4th Straight As Indians Whip Athletics 7-2

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Bob Lemon won his fourth straight game without a loss Wednesday night as Cleveland Indians trounced Philadelphia Athletics 7-2. It was smooth going for Lemon until Dave Philley's sixth-inning three-run homer making it even easier. One of Lemon's few lapses came as Vic Power hit a leadoff homer in the eighth.

The Indians got away to a fast start with two runs on three strikes and an error in the first inning. Bob Avila and Al Smith singled in order. Then, with one out, Al Rosen singled Avila home and, when the throw-in got past Zernial, Smith also scored.

Alex Kellner, who went the first six innings for the Athletics, gave up all eight Cleveland hits. Marion Franco finished up on the mound for Philadelphia.

Tough luck Bob Turley lost another two-hitter Wednesday but he has his own wildness to blame for New York Yankees' 4-2 decision over Baltimore Orioles.

The fast-balling right-hander had a no-hitter going until Joe Collins

tripped with the bases loaded in the fifth inning. The Yanks already had broken his shutout in the same inning on three walks and Eddie Lopat's squeeze bunt.

Turley walked seven in all before he left for a pinch hitter in the seventh. He held a 1-0 lead on Jim Fridley's fourth inning home run when he lost his control. The only other hit, after the triple, was Yogi Berra's single in the sixth.

Lopat, masterful with men on base, allowed six hits enroute to his fourth straight victory.

St. Catherines Teepees Defeat Frontenacs 9-1

QUEBEC (CP)—St. Catherines Teepees Wednesday night humiliated Quebec Frontenacs with a 9-1 victory before 11,912 fans to break a 2-2 deadlock in the best-of-seven eastern Canada Memorial Cup final. The sixth game is scheduled for Toronto Friday night.

Barry Cullen scored four times to spark the Teepees assault.

Hank Ciesla counted twice, including the lone first period marker. Brian Cullen, Cec Hoekstra and Jack Armstrong pumped home the other St. Catherines goals.

Mike Ratcliff broke goalie Marvin Edwards' brilliant bid for a shutout with the last tally of the game at 16:11 of the final period.

Five of the 13 minor penalties figured in the scoring, three on one. Referees Ching McDonald and Stan Pratt, both of Ottawa charged Frontenacs with seven of the infractions, including one to goalie Jacques Marcotte for kicking Armstrong.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Robert Lee Trice, the Bible-reading rookie pitcher of Philadelphia Athletics, is doing pretty well for a guy who can't find his fast ball.

"I know I can throw harder than I've been throwing," he said Tuesday night. "Maybe the warm weather will help."

One of his teammates listened to the conversation and then commented: "Four wins and no losses and the guy ain't loose yet. I'm glad I'm on your side, pal."

The 27-year-old Negro—first of his race to join the Athletics—has compiled an earned run average of 1.85—seven earned runs in 34 innings of pitching. He's shut out the Yankees and topped Baltimore on a three-hitter.

He won 21 games for Ottawa of the International League before coming to the Athletics in late 1953.

At the rate he is going, he could win American League rookie of the year honors in a walk.

Rochford Square School defeated Notre Dame Academy 24-4 yesterday afternoon in a basketball game at the Holy Name Hall.

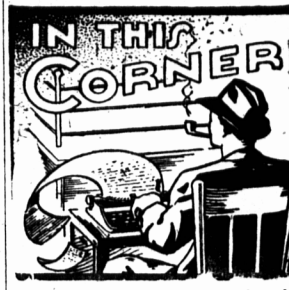
Daphne MacMillan was high scorer for Rochford Square with seven points followed by Pearl Stanley and Martha Cummiskey with six points.

Baseball coach Randy Edwards is expected to arrive in Charlotte around June 1 to commence his instruction duties with the young ball players. City officials are delighted that they have been able to procure the services of Edwards for another summer. The big and friendly American did a great job with the Junior, Minor League and Little League players a year ago. He guided his Juniors, Little Leagues and two of his Minor League teams to Island Championships. Randy taught his players how to work on the field and what is more important he showed them how to act both on and off the diamond.

It has provided relaxation and entertainment in the evening for fellows who have been busy earning their living throughout the day.

Winning the championship is not always foremost in the minds of many of the players. Everyone of them wants to win the City Title and the Island Championship just as much as any other athlete wants to win a title. Every one of them will play to the utmost of his ability to win but if he loses he knows that he has had the fun of trying and that he has the season's fun of playing. This, we think, is fulfilling the end for social workers.

King Maple 8-5 Favorite For Queen's Plate

TORONTO (CP)—Odds against King Maple, Canada's outstanding juvenile in 1953 and the favorite to take the 96th running of the Queen's Plate June 12, have been trimmed to 8-5.

The strapping colt, owned by Mrs. Gordon Mackenzie of Toronto, was quoted as low as 7-5 a month ago. However, his price eased to 2-1 in recent weeks when his main rival, Queen's Own owned by E. P. Taylor of Toronto, turned in good times during training trials for the 1 1/2-mile classic.

King Maple's odds were cut after last week-end's interim payment of \$100 reduced the field to 43 three-year-old horses. The favorite is the shortest-priced winter-book favorite in the history of the Dominion's premier racing event.

SECOND CHOICE

Queen's Own is second choice at 3-1. Another Taylor colt, Free Trade, has been reduced sharply from 20-1 to 6-1 and is a solid third choice. Fourth favorite is H. H. Appleby of Vancouver, holding steady at 8-1.

Only other Western Canada contender is Mr. Speaker, owned by Hon. Lucien Maynard, attorney-general for Alberta, and quoted at 60-1. Candeboye, still eligible, was bred in Manitoba but now is owned by Eric Craddock of Toronto. He is 25-1.

Quoted at 10-1 are Hartney, owned by K. R. Marshall of Toronto, Colistoe, from the Bur-Pit stables, Hamilton, and Beau Bunty owned by B. S. Chris of Kitchener, Ont.

Longest shots are quoted at 80-1 Sequoy, owned by L. C. Scott of Toronto and Brown Atom, carrying the colors of Allen Case of Toronto.

The June 12 date is the latest in the history of the Plate.

Two Plate trials, in place of the customary one trial in effect since 1944, will be held. The first, of six furlongs, is slated for May 22, and the second, of one mile and 70 yards, will be held June 2.

Roberts Pitches Phillies To 10-3 Victory

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Robin Roberts, who lasted only two innings in his starting effort just 24 hours earlier, came back to pitch Philadelphia Phillies to a 10-3 victory over St. Louis Cardinals Wednesday night. The Redbirds, held to seven hits, used home runs by Joe Frazier and Rip Repulski to score their only runs.

The victory, Roberts' third of the year, kept the Phillies in first place in the National League.

Bunching 4 of their 13 hits in the third inning, when they were assisted by two Cardinal errors, the Phillies scored four runs off starter Tom Poholsky, who was charged with the defeat.

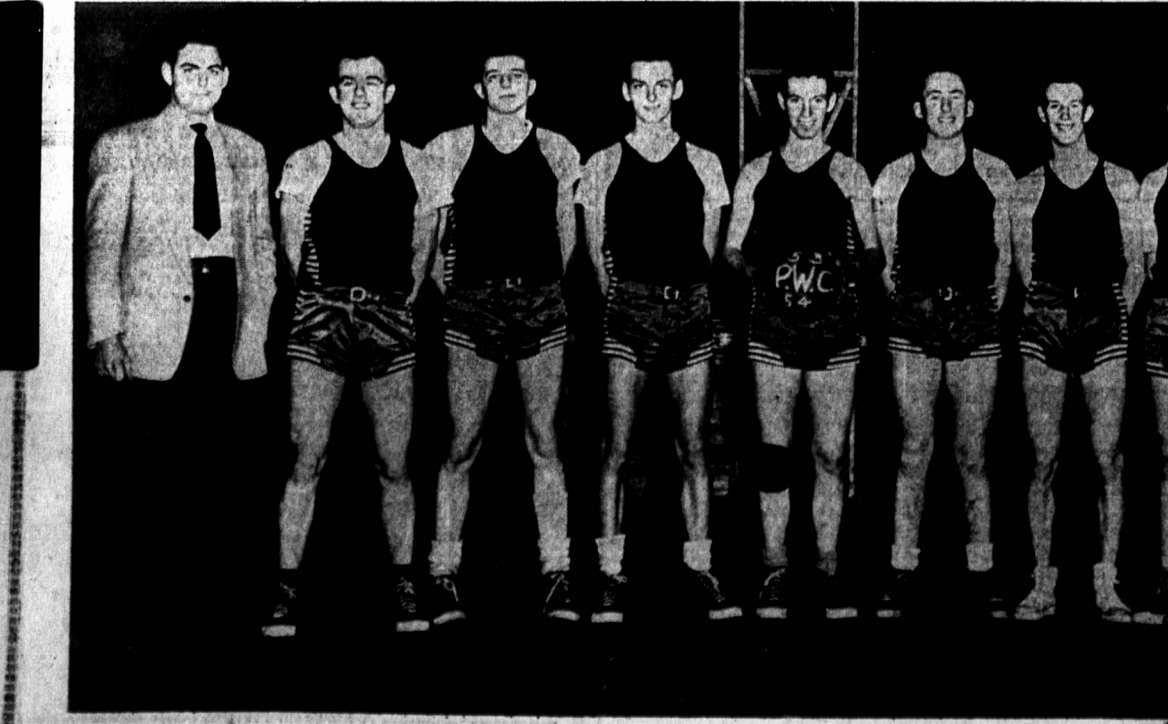

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Rookie Conley Wins First Major League Victory

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Gene Conley, towering rookie right-hander, scattered six hits for his first major league victory Wednesday night as Milwaukee beat Pittsburgh 4-1 before a surprising turnout of 13,194 fans in 37-degree temperatures.

The Braves collected only seven hits off a trio of Pittsburgh pitchers, three of them by Johnny Logan, but scored once without a hit and again on Eddie Mathews' fifth home run of the year to wrap up their second straight win and clumb over Chicago into sixth place in the tight National League race.

Mathews' homer, his first in 10 days and second at home this year, came off Dick Thies, third Pittsburgh hurler, with the bases empty in the seventh. The young slugger, major league homer king last year with 47, also drove in the Braves' first run with a sacrifice fly in the first inning.

Gains Decision Over Durelle

NEWCASTLE, N.B. (CP)—Philadelphia light heavyweight Wadell Hannah gained a close 10-round decision over Yvon Durelle of Bale Ste. Anne, N.B., in the feature bout of a boxing card here Wednesday night. Both weighed 168.
