## ST. PETER'S MISSION.

A Good Attendance at Yesterday's  
Services.

The Mission services in St. Peter's  
Cathedral yesterday were well attended,  
the church being quite full at the evening  
service.

At eleven o'clock Holy Communion was  
celebrated by Rev. T. H. Hunt. The mis-  
sioner preached a powerful sermon from  
Judges v-25, "Curse ye Meroz," (said the  
angel of the Lord,) curse ye bitterly the  
inhabitants thereof; because they came  
not to the help of the Lord, to the help of  
the Lord against the mighty."

At the afternoon service Father Conran  
spoke to men only, taking for his subject  
the questions (1) "What am I?" (2) "What  
am I here for?" and showed by very  
simple reasoning that man is not a mere  
animal, not a mere machine, but a soul,  
tending towards an objective point, and  
we are all here to try to reach that point—  
Heaven.

In the evening the regular service  
was omitted. There was no choir,  
but the singing was nevertheless hearty.  
The missioner took the whole service and  
preached from Genesis 1-26 27.

To-day and every day this week there  
will be a Bible reading and instruction  
at 4 o'clock and mission service and ser-  
mon at 7.30.

During the week Holy Communion  
will be celebrated every morning at 6.50  
and at 7.45 with a spiritual instruction at  
7.25. Also Matins at 9 a. m. and inter-  
cessory service at 12 a. m.

**CIVIC ELECTION.**—Tomorrow will be  
civic election day in Summerside.

**HOCKEY.**—Arrangements have been  
made for a return match between the

S' Side on the same night as the Abegweit-  
Star game. No extra charge will be made.

**GRACE CHURCH.**—The final sermon on  
"The Women of the Old Testament" the  
twelfth in the series—was last evening de-  
livered by Rev. W. J. Kirby. Queen  
Father" was the subject, and the discourse  
was up to the high standard of the preced-  
ing ones.

**TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.**—The regular  
meeting of the Charlottetown Teachers'  
Institute was held on Saturday evening.  
The first half hour was taken up with a  
discussion on the question of home lessons,  
which is to be continued at the next meet-  
ing. Miss Ashly then read an extract  
from Landau's "Memory in Education,"  
treating of perception, which provoked a  
lively discussion. Further phases of this  
latter subject will also be considered at the  
next meeting of the Association to be held  
on Saturday, 11th March.

**HOCKEY TROPHY.**—The intermediate  
trophy presented by M. A. A. Bartlett for  
competition by the hockey clubs in the in-  
termediate series is to be placed on view in  
the show window of Rankin a drug store in  
a few days. The trophy sits on  
an ebony base, and the design is  
a very pretty one. The height is  
about twenty-five inches. A figure of a  
hockeyist on skates, with stick in hand,  
stands at the top and on the two sides  
below are a beaver and a row of maple  
leaves, Canada's emblems, and nearer the  
bottom on either side are two hockey  
sticks crossed. The decoration of the  
trophy is very pretty, and the prize is one  
well worth striving for.

**POLICE COURT.**—This forenoon John  
Ring, charged with being drunk and  
incapable, was fined \$90 or 90 days. John  
Stewart, for fast driving on the streets, was  
fined \$8 or 40 days, three previous con-  
victions for the same offence having been  
proven against him. M. M. Galbraith,  
for maliciously injuring property, was also  
fined \$8 or 40 days, and ordered to pay  
damages. Edward McCabe, a truckman,  
for ill-treating his horse on the 22nd inst.,  
was fined \$5 or 30 days. William Rodd,  
charged with stealing a quantity of beef was  
and some dry goods on the evening of the  
9th of December, the property of John  
McNevin. This case was dismissed.

**THE STANLEY.**—The Stanley arrived at  
Georgetown this morning about 9  
o'clock. She left Pictou yesterday and  
was out in the straits all night. The ice  
encountered was the heaviest this season,  
and only three miles of open water were  
met with. As might be expected a large  
freight was brought over consisting of two  
carloads wheat, two carloads flour and six  
carloads general merchandise, ten carloads  
in all. Among the passengers were Profes-  
sors Robertson and Macoun who are  
visiting the island to deliver a series of  
agricultural lectures. A special train  
left Georgetown at half-past eleven with  
the passengers, and 89 bags of mail, trans-  
ferred from the Capes route. The train  
arrived in Charlottetown at 1.30 o'clock.

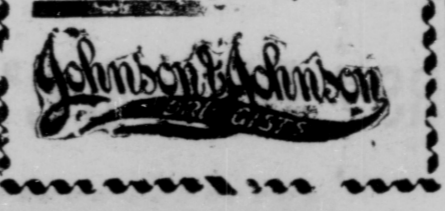
**ST. DUNSTON'S CATHEDRAL.**—The second  
in the series of special Lenten sermons  
was last evening delivered by Rev. J. F.  
Johnston. His subject was, "Are the  
Bishops of Rome Successors of St. Peter?"  
He answered the question in the affirma-  
tive, declaring that Christ chose St.  
Peter as the head of the Church which He  
instituted upon earth, that Peter filled the  
Episcopal chair in Rome where he suffered  
martyrdom, and that the present Pontiff,  
Leo XIII, is his successor, that Peter still  
lives in the person of the present Pope.  
Father Johnston supported his argument  
by quoting from the Scriptures and from  
Protestant and Catholic writers. His dis-  
course was able and eloquent, and was  
followed throughout with the closest  
attention.
