## HALIFAX GOLFER BREAKS COURSE RECORD

### Miss Maisie Howard Has Eight Stroke Margin In The Qualifying Round

Defending her tri-province championship, Miss Maisie Howard of Gorsebrook, Halifax, proved her supremacy over the rest of the field yesterday in the Maritime women's golf tournament being played over the Belvedere course when she posted the lowest score in the qualifying round, 82 over the 76-par Belvedere layout.

Miss Howard's score broke the course record for women, 84, held for the last five years by Mrs. Manning Bagnall of Charlottetown. Officials said it was the lowest score ever made in a Maritime women's tournament.

The Maritime champion tacked together a 40 on the outward nine to a 42 on the home stretch for her record-breaking tally. Spoiling her chances for getting in the 70's were three three-putts on the greens.

Those approaching closest to the champion from out of the field of 48 were the favorites Barbara Trites of Bridgewater and Dorothy Holmes of Truro, each chalking up an even 90. Next came the Island's hope in the tournament, Marion Morris of Charlottetown who carded a 91.

Another Nova Scotian, Mrs. H. P. Connors of Ashburn, Halifax, came next in the championship division, with 93. Close on her heels was the Prince Edward Island Champion, Mrs. W. E. Cotton of Charlottetown with 94. The best New Brunswick score in the qualifying round was tallied by Mrs. J. T. Driscoll, Riverdale, Saint John. Mrs. Driscoll's 96 placed her seventh in the championship division.

Two mainland golfers withdrew from the tournament, Miss Cairine Wilson of Algonquin, St. Andrew's, N. B., and Mrs. W. H. Piers of Ashburn, Halifax, leaving 14 players in the second flight.

The lengthy fairways of Belvedere's 6,263-yard course provided plenty of roll on drives after being baked all summer due to the hot sunny days. Traps were well-sanded and banks shaved around the greens tailored all season for the tournament.

#### Low Punching Costly As Armstrong Loses Title Bout To Lou Ambers

YANKEE STADIUM, New York, Aug. 22.—Lou Ambers of Herkimer, N. Y., regained the world lightweight championship tonight by outpointing Henry Armstrong of Los Angeles in a wild slugfest battle in which Armstrong was penalized five rounds by Referee Arthur Donovan for low punching. If it hadn't been for those five heads, which provoked a howl of outraged protest from Armstrong's corner, Hammer Henry would have won—and retained the title in a walk.

The little negro, who skyrocketed out of St. Louis, by way of Los Angeles, three years ago to win the lightweight welterweight and featherweight championships, and hold them simultaneously, forced the fighting all the way.

He never stopped coming forward into the storm of left uppercuts and hooks showered on him by the Herkimer Hurricane from upstate New York.

All in all, therefore, there was nothing conclusive about the fight, except that everything is all set now for a third meeting between the pair. They tangled the first time a year ago, and the hammer detoured the square-jawed little Italian.

### Boston Yacht Winner Of Ocean Race

HALIFAX, Aug. 22.—(CP)—Winner of the Marblehead-Halifax ocean yacht race, the Boston Yacht Club Yawl Tioga Too swung at anchor in harbor tonight while stragglers in the 366-mile contest continued to poke their way through the fog shrouding the Nova Scotia coast.

In second place and winner in her class was the Grenadier of Marblehead, which arrived off the breakwater of the Royal Nova Scotia Yacht Squadron at 1:50 P.M. A.D.T. today, nine hours after the Tioga Too felt her way to anchorage after the race from Massachusetts. Tioga's entrance was made without benefit of land-fall until inside harbor.

Behind the two leaders tonight came the sloop Gypsy of Boston and Rampage II of New York. Gypsy passed the finish at 7:27 P.M., and Rampage trailed her by 12 minutes, but the New York craft's time allowance placed her ahead of Gypsy on corrected time.

Tioga Too, a scratch boat, covered the distance in 59:02.30 hours. Tonight, she was established definitely as winner.

### Seniors' Golf Title Won By Fr. Holland

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Aug. 22.—(CP)—Rev. J. Walter Holding, Saint John, white-haired parish priest and golf enthusiast, today won his second Maritime seniors' golf association title in nine years.

The six-foot golfing priest, aged 61, a well-known baseball player in his district in his younger days, fired an 82 over the par 70 Riverside course this afternoon; he carded 80 yesterday in the first round and thus had a total of 162.

Rallying when he had to dig recovery shots out of his bag, Father Holland showed he had gained valuable experience in the Canadian open meet on the same layout last week. He is believed to be the first clergyman ever to compete in the Canadian open. He played two rounds in the latter competition, shooting 89 and 84.

The new champion, who succeeds J. Marsh Matthews, of Chester, N.S., and Baltimore, Md., gets a bit of golf practice every winter at Pinehurst, N.C., Matthews won the previous three tournaments but was absent from this year's competition.

Gaining second place for the first time in five years of play among the Maritime golfing "ancients," William Graham, Saint John, added 85 to his 83 of yesterday for 168. Inaccurate long shots cost him an opportunity to defeat Father Holland, his frequent companion on New Brunswick links.

Ray M. Wyman, Yarmouth, ended in third position with 86 today and a total of 170. Three strokes farther back, deadlocked for fourth place with 173, were William Dickson, Halifax, and Dr. H. E. Small, Port Fairfield, Me. They were only one stroke ahead of Dr. L. M. Morton, Yarmouth, and Col. Horace Westmorland, Halifax.

Col. Westmorland turned in his day's best score, 78, but he scored 96 yesterday.

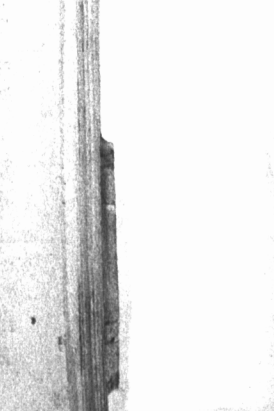
