SOME CAUSES OF EXTREME SLEEPINESS

Most physicians, when they find a patient whose chief symptom is a desire to sleep most of his time, try to find some infection (teeth, tonsils, gums, gall bladder, large intestine).

These personality studies and psychiatric investigations revealed that most of these patients had immature and inadequate personalities and had previously reacted to stress by developing mental and emotional symptoms.

As an excessive desire for sleep may be due to pressure on the brain or to some gland disturbance, these conditions were investigated but neither condition was found in cases thoroughly examined.

As stated above, most cases of extreme sleepiness, both day and night, are usually caused by infection which gradually increases in amount until the individual spends most of his time asleep.
