More Exercise Needed By Legion Track Coach

SUMMERSIDE — Geoffrey Dyson, former coach of English Olympic track and field team and now chief of track and field for all Canada, was the guest speaker yesterday at noon at the Summerside Branch of the Canadian Legion where a banquet was held in his honor.

Mr. Dyson, 56, Morrison welcomed Mr. Dyson to the town and presented him with a souvenir of Summerside, Ben Channon, a past president of the local legion, introduced the speaker.

Dyson said that the reasons that academic pressure sometimes makes a man forget he's a physical animal and that he needs to exercise to keep his physique in top condition.

He stressed the point that calisthenics are not as important as recreational pursuits to keep physically fit. Older people were in less need of physical strength than cardio-vascular efficiency. The lower limbs are becoming increasingly redundant in Canada, he said, and the great exercise of walking is forgotten.

A country can win lots of medals for athletic supremacy and yet rank low in physical fitness, he said, citing the United States as an example. Physical fitness should be emphasized for everyone, not just the top athletes.

Mr. Dyson said he would be back in Summerside during the Lobster Carnival in July in connection with his new position.

Dr. Hillard Clark, first vice-president of the branch thanked the speaker, and Clarence Steele, second vice-president, presented him with a gift from the legion.

Donald Thompson, Dominion secretary of the legion, who is accompanying Mr. Dyson on his tour of the Atlantic provinces, gave Mercur Mullin, a member of the legion's provincial executive, was master of ceremonies.

WEST PRINCE FERRY

In lieu of the customary thank you and support of all efforts to have another 'Abegweit' added to the Borden run by the Prince and West Prince Ferry system to duplicate in the west the service given to the east by the Borden-Fries at Wood Islands.

It stated the proposed new ferry would open up the "blue turquoise" western section of the province which "has lagged behind the rest of the province in the development of a tourism industry." The brief added establishment of the ferry service would do anything else, and bring the area up to par from the tourist standpoint and said "it must be recognized that this is not a lowlier section of our province than that of scenic West Prince."

The Association reported a tremendous increase in the tourist business over the past 20 years as its brief gave all figures for vehicles and passengers which showed that at Borden-Fries the number of vehicles increased from 9,446 in 1942 to 199,775 last year. During the same period the number of passengers on this ferry route jumped from 126,718 to 462,791.

It was noted that the Borden-Fries ferry has 1,000,000 passengers in 1962. Vehicle totals for the years mentioned were 4,641 and 51,500.

Premier Shaw said "we have had research projects going on for some time. I can't understand why this question was brought in." He said a "comprehensive survey of the province is about to take place into a number of aspects of the economy, in which this will not be a casual survey," he went on, "it will be carried out by highly trained people." He counted 13 of some previous surveys made in the province were "not worth much" and he would wait years for a report.

"I don't believe in setting up too many committees," he said, "a research department. We don't need another. That's not very far off — there's no doubt about that."

Wildlife Park To Open At N. Rustico In June

Prince Edward Island's tourist industry will get a shot in the arm this summer with the addition of a major sightseeing attraction.

Charles Bartlett has announced that the P.E.I. Wildlife Park Ltd. is setting up a display of native Atlantic Provinces animals at North Rustico adjacent to the P.E.I. National Park and approximately 25 miles from Charlottetown.

The new park consists of 100 acres of land, half cleared and half wooded with a four-acre pond centrally located for the display of waterfowl. Thirty-five acres are fenced in and a parking lot for 800 cars is available.

Mr. Bartlett, president and general manager of the entire company, said the park will be open since last October, and it is planned to have the operation in full swing by the first of June.
