

Council Agrees On Rink Project

MONTAGUE — The regular business of the Montague Town Council was set aside last night to deal with the proposed artificial hockey rink for the community.

All councillors were present for the meeting. Also present were the members of the rink committee from the Community Welfare League Limited. R.R. Beck, Richard MacLean, Garnet MacIntyre Sr., and H.M. Smith.

Following over two hours of discussion the town council agreed to support the Community Welfare League Ltd. in building the new rink by authorizing the league to build and operate the rink and by agreeing to apply for a loan of \$12,000 through the municipal loan fund for the erection of an artificial rink.

The chairman of the Community Welfare League Ltd., R.R. Beck, pointed out that the league now has in excess of \$32,000 on hand, and is ready to raise an additional \$12,000 immediately with a campaign for funds — and that an additional \$30,000 will be made available under the winter works program.

It is hoped to get underway with the erection of the new rink Nov. 1 so as to have the rink available this winter and completed in March.

H.M. Smith has been engaged as manager for the building and erection of the new rink. The league, incorporated in 1921, has supplied a hockey and skating rink to the area since that time and the present members feel that it is their duty to do so for the children of the area now and for the future.

Previous to the rink matter the minutes were read and business arising from them dealt with.

It was noted that the radio communication project was nearing completion. Duvar's Radio and TV Service supplied the equipment and were installing it.

A small portion of land in the vicinity of the regional high school was relinquished to the school board as requested.

CONGRATULATIONS
A letter of congratulations is to be forwarded to Arthur E. Sullivan on the winning of the maritime juvenile title with his baseball team. Mr. Sullivan for the past several years has worked hard to this end and on Sunday was quoted as saying "this is what we were after, however, the team had received assistance from the town council to the extent of \$100.00. V.R. Fepler, was present to try to clarify the parking situation bordering on his property. He said he did not want to do anything that would interfere with other businesses in the area. The town police chairman, Coun. Athol Robertson, agreed to deal with the matter.

Ed Downe, policeman for the town, advised in his report that 12 cases had been before the courts and that \$202.50 had been taken in fines.

During the month, two special meetings had been called, to deal with the building of a home for the aged. This meeting resulted in the previous dump area being made available for such a home. The second meeting was called to deal with applications for permits to erect a trailer within the town by Raymond Griffin which was granted under the by-laws of the town and the other to Andy Landry to build a garage.

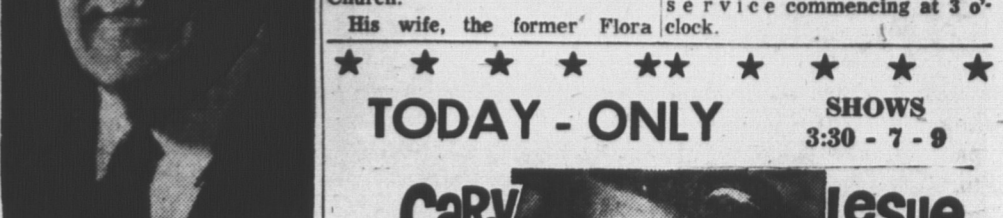
The meeting was adjourned for the continuation of town business and reports to Oct. 19.

SUGGESTS COMMITTEE
Jury members were not so kind with their comments following a visit to Riverside Hospital. "We find the facilities antiquated, so much so that certain buildings are a fire hazard, but patients looked after as well as possible under the circumstances. The jury suggested a health planning committee to plan construction of new buildings where the old ones are obsolete to take care of the ever-increasing future demand.

It was suggested that the prisoners at the Queens County Jail be kept further back from the front sidewalk and street by means of a fence until a new jail is built.

CORRESPONDENCE
Correspondence was received from the Unemployment Insurance Commission regarding the covering of town employees with unemployment insurance and from the tax office of the provincial government relating to the registering of the town's fire hose truck, free of charge, if used exclusively as a fire fighting vehicle.

The public property committee has purchased a quantity of plywood and lumber to install a new ceiling in the rink dance hall. The installation work on this project is being done free of charge by members of the Georgetown Lions Club.

It was decided to obtain information and prices on the cost of a furnace for installation in the rink to provide heat for the office, dressing rooms and dance hall. The oil stoves that up to now have serviced those areas have deteriorated to such an extent that they are practically unusable.

It was decided to place a new top on the well known as Griffin's Pump and to fill in a dug well on George Street.

The chairman of the street committee reported that a new culvert was being placed in position at the corner of Victoria and Durham Streets. Other culverts in the town will be cleaned out before the winter sets in. A ditch has been run along part of Weeks Crescent on the west side to allow the placing of culverts to private driveways.

True Bills Found In Murder Cases

The Grand Jury sitting at the fall session of the Supreme Court found the two bills which charged Clarence Gallant (commonly known as Perry) with the killing of the late Everett MacDonald and his wife Evelyn Shamrock and Thistle, late last July, to be "true-bills."

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell presided at yesterday's sitting. The Chief Justice explained to the members of the Grand Jury that their sole duty in their investigation of these respective capital murder cases was not to convict or acquit, but to decide in the interest of justice whether or not these cases warranted a trial.

The Chief Justice admonished the Grand Jury that their duty was not to determine the admissibility of evidence, but rather to decide if a trial was warranted. If a trial resulted from their findings, then the admissibility of evidence would be argued when that trial was in process.

Members of the Grand Jury were also informed of their other duties which include: investigation of law enforcement in Queens County, in general, and more specifically to report on public places such as: Queens County Jail, The Court House and Riverside Hospital.

Following the Grand Jury's decision on the respective bills the accused, Clarence Gallant, was arraigned.

The accused pleaded not guilty to the respective capital murder charges when he appeared yesterday afternoon. Charles R. McQuaid is counsel for the accused.

A.K. Scales and Gerald R. Foster, Q.C., are acting for the crown.

It was ordered following the plea, that the case of The Crown vs. Clarence Gallant on a capital murder charge following the death of Evelyn MacDonald begin this morning at 11.00 a.m.

The second case against the accused will be brought to trial immediately following the completion of the latter.
