Potato Crop Prospects Good

The September 15 Canadian crop report issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics places the total potato crop at 54,789,000 bushels. This compares with the final crop report for 1951 based on the census taken last year of 48,355,000 bushels, a difference of nearly 6 1/2 million bushels.

Reports coming in from various sources indicate there was a fairly heavy frost in both Maine and New Brunswick the night of September 7th which materially reduced crop prospects in both of these heavy producing areas. This Province escaped any serious injury.

Canada Plans To Arm CF-100 Canuck Jet Plane With Guided Missile

OTTAWA, Sept. 18 (CP)—Canada plans to arm the CF-100 Canuck jet fighter with a guided missile eventually but the missile won't be ready for years, it was indicated reliably today.

The air-to-air missile being developed by the Defence Research Board and the R. C. A. F. is the one earmarked to help in the defence of Canada.

First tests are likely to take place early in 1953 but, that is said authoritatively to be no sign that the missile is anywhere near ready to go into general use.

There apparently will be a missile fired from the Canuck, then tests will be mainly to study the problem of mating plane and weapon for guidance in further design and development.

Officials of the Defence Research Board say the missile program is going well and that Canada has been helped by development already done by the United States and Britain.

There are various types of guided missiles. Canada has gone into the air-to-air field. That is, missiles fired by one plane against another.

The aim is to make the Canuck an airplane capable of fighting in any weather over great distances, then destroying it by a missile that can be directed into the target.

Ch'town Ministerial Association Meets

The opening meeting of the Charlottetown Ministerial Association was held in the Y. M. C. A. building on Tuesday with the President, the Rev. Henry Barber in the chair and the secretary, Mr. F. B. Gamble at the desk, with the following members in attendance: Rev. E. C. Evans, Rev. M. D. Dunbar, Rev. J. D. Davison, Rev. G. C. Webster, Rev. J. T. Irwin, Rev. J. T. Ibbott and Rev. T. H. B. Somers.

The main business of the meeting was the planning of the Charlottetown observance of the publication of the new Revised Standard Version of the Bible which will take the form of a public meeting in the Central Christian Church on Tuesday, September 30th, at 8 o'clock.

The Minister of the Church, Rev. M. D. Dunbar will preside and conduct the worship assisted by the President, Rev. Henry Barber. The address will be given by the principal of Prince of Wales College, Dr. Frank MacKinnon, of the subject of "The Word of Life in Living Language."

A special feature of the service will be the presentation of six copies of the new Version to senior churchmen, Sunday school workers, youth leaders, educationists, and representative parents.

A special order of service has been prepared which will be used in three hundred similar services across Canada and three thousand such services across the United States on the same day.

Arrangements were also made for the visit to the City of Dr. Florence Collier of the staff of the Women's Christian Medical College in North India. Dr. Collier will be in the city on October 19th. She will speak in different churches and address a mass rally in St. Paul's Parish Hall that evening.

A general discussion was held on the subject of Sunday funerals and strong endorsement was given on the part of every minister present to the resolution adopted by the Prince Edward Island Ministerial Association requesting that Sunday funerals be dispensed with except in cases of extreme urgency.

Sincere sympathy was expressed in the illness of the Rev. Dr. A. D. MacKenzie and a message of kindly goodwill was ordered sent to him. The next meeting of the Association is scheduled to take place in October.

Need For Additional Schools Emphasized By Education Ass'n

TORONTO, Sept. 18 (CP)—Building of new schools to keep pace with booming enrollment and the training period for elementary teachers after they leave high school were two problems that came up for discussion yesterday at the Canadian Education Association Convention.

A report predicting future needs showed that a minimum of 78,000,000 would have to be spent on new schools in Canada every year to keep up with enrollments. Ontario's increase in enrollment is estimated at 40,000 pupils a year and for the whole country three times as many.

New elementary schools could be built at a cost of \$650 a pupil, the report stated, making a total of \$26,000,000 for Ontario alone. Schools that have extra rooms for physical education and assembly would cost \$850 per pupil, making a total of \$34,000,000 for Ontario and \$102,000,000 for all Canada.

Most schools would fall somewhere between the two over-all figures. Dealing with the teacher training period, most delegates agreed that the one-year course is far from sufficient. It was stated during the discussion that Alberta is the only province where two years are needed to teach in elementary schools.

Bus Driver Stabs Motorist To Death

DETROIT, Sept. 18 (AP)—A bus driver stabbed a motorist to death in an argument during rush-hour traffic yesterday.

Police said Lewis Van Benjamin, 31, Negro bus driver, admitted the stabbing but insisted he acted in self-defence. The victim was Homer McCoy, 37.

Traffic had piled up at a factory quit-time and the street was blocked. Police said Van Benjamin told them he got out of his bus and tried to direct traffic so McCoy could back his car and make a turn. McCoy made the turn by going over a curb, then got out of his car and threatened Van Benjamin.

Police quoted Van Benjamin as saying: "The man then reached into his pocket pulled a knife and took a swing at me. I got my pocket knife out, too, and made a lunge for him. He turned around and started walking slowly down the street before he collapsed." Van Benjamin was held for investigation of murder.

United Church Budget Increased

HAMILTON, Sept. 17 (CP)—The general council of the United Church of Canada today approved a record budget of \$3,850,000 for 1953, a \$350,000 increase over last year.

The budget, contained in the report of the sessional committee on the missionary and maintenance fund, was passed unanimously.

The council passed the following budgets for conferences: Newfoundland, \$56,700; Maritime, \$369,400; Montreal and Ottawa, \$443,300; Bay of Quinte, \$313,700; Toronto, \$804,100; Hamilton, \$493,600; London, \$483,300; Manitoba, \$259,300; Saskatchewan, \$207,500; Alberta, \$209,500; British Columbia, \$206,200.

Promoted To Rank of Cadet

The promotion of Leading Seaman Ernest B. Larkin, 21, of St. Peter's Bay, P. E. I. to the rank of Cadet in the supply branch of the Royal Canadian Navy, was announced yesterday by Naval Headquarters, Ottawa.

Cadet Larkin joined the R. C. N. at HMCS Queen Charlotte here in February, 1949, as an ordinary seaman. After a year's training at HMCS Naden, Esquimalt, and HMCS Cornwallis, near Digby, N. S., Cadet Larkin was drafted to HMCS S Halda but transferred one month later to her sister-ship, HMCS Huron. He served in the Huron for 20 months, during which time he saw eight months Korean service last year.

Two years ago he was promoted to able seaman and earlier this year was promoted to leading seaman. Upon his promotion to cadet he returns home to HMCS Queen Charlotte, and he will be attached to this division while attending St. Dunstan's College under naval auspices. Cadet Larkin had already completed one year at university before he entered the navy.
