BRITISH POLITICS.

The Liberals in Great Britain are not making a noisy canvass, but are conducting what would be described in America as a still hunt. They do not expect to carry the elections, and, indeed, would be embarrassed if the unexpected should happen, and they should find themselves in a majority and then be unable to form a working, homogeneous ministry. Their leading men frankly concede a Unionist victory, and assert that Mr. Chamberlain must have the responsibility of settling the war. What they do expect is that by a careful and judicious choice of candidates and by the avoidance of wasteful contests they may be able to reduce the Unionist majority to fifty or seventy.

Every appeal to the electorate is fraught with surprises and the Liberals may do better than their most hopeful politicians imagine. Without doubt it is true that the last parliament was more strongly Unionist than the country, and that at least thirty seats naturally Liberal, were captured accidentally. These seats under normal condition would be regained by the Liberals this year, but as many more are imperilled and their radical holders are out of touch with British politics, political experts for this reason are disposed to believe that the Liberal gain will be balanced by the losses, and that the new parliament will be as strongly Unionist as the old parliament.

THE BEST WAY.

'South Africa' of Aug. 18 says: "There has been a good deal of talk in certain quarters about the case of a young Yeomanry lieutenant. Serving in the ranks of his company were several gentlemen with whom he had been on friendly terms at Oxford and elsewhere. Towards these troopers, for some inexplicable reason, the officer was, from the first, most severe, and upon them he always laid the more objectionable duties. Goaded at length by continual petty tyranny they drew lots, and one man of the party administered a severe thrashing to the lieutenant on behalf of all. Tried by court-martial, the trooper was sentenced to ten years' hard labor. The whole of the evidence was forwarded to Lord Roberts, together with the finding of the court, to receive his confirmation. The commander-in-chief commuted the sentence to one week's imprisonment, and notified the officer that a transport was awaiting his departure for England."

CANADIAN CORRESPONDENTS.

As the Transvaal war marked an era in the military history of Canada, so it did in the annals of Canadian journalism, says the London Canadian Gazette. Never until last year had Canadian newspapers been represented in the field of battle, and their enterprise was rewarded by excellent results. It was through a brilliant exploit by Mr. Frederick Hamilton, on behalf of the Toronto Globe, that the extent of the terrible losses among the Canadian infantry at Paardeberg was first made known to the world. His message was well ahead of the official one, and naturally thrilled Canada from end to end. Subsequently, throughout the trying march to Bloemfontein and onward to Pretoria, the movements of the Canadian infantry were picturesquely and faithfully recorded by Mr. Hamilton, and, on behalf of the Montreal Star, by Mr. Richmond Smith. To The Globe and Star, too, Canadians are chiefly indebted for their news of the Mounted Rifles, whose fortunes were followed by Mr. John Ewan for the former paper and Mr. H. S. White for the latter. Both of them have more than once been in peril of their lives, and in the affair of the captured train at Honing Spruit they had a particularly narrow escape. Mr. White, it is interesting to record, was Reuter's correspondent in the Klondike during the early days of the gold boom.

The London Saturday Review has been analysing the financial conditions at the Paris Exposition, and finds some depressing results. It was expected that the average number of paying visitors would amount at least to 300,000 a day, and now only a little more

than 100,000 are passing the turnstiles, of whom 40,000 have free tickets. Once, but once only, 400,000 persons were in attendance, but in the season the average attendance rarely exceeded 200,000, from which must be deducted the 40,000 free entrances, showing that the attendance has fallen far below what was anticipated at the outset. The prospects are that when the day of settlement comes there will be at least 30,000,000 of the 65,000,000 tickets that were issued remaining unsold. These tickets are stamped one franc each, but the Review says two are now sold for 40 centimes, while the Credit Lyonnais is glad to dispose of 100 tickets for 21 francs. "It is prophesied the tickets are likely to sink to 15 and even to 10 centimes each, and in November to become practically worthless."

The Montreal Witness remarks that many stories are told of the luxury and extravagance of kings, but there is not a potentate, big or little, in the world to-day who would have the audacity, even if he had the bad taste, to make such an ostentatious display as the Tammany chiefs made on their recent trip from New York to attend the Saratoga convention. There were sixteen hundred of them, occupying a long train of Wagner palace cars. The journey occupied only five hours, for which an astonishing prodigality of luxuries were provided. Attached to the train were several cars loaded with four tons of ice, stacks of cases of champagne, whisky, beer and other liquors, besides cooked meats, bread, biscuits and other edibles in quantities to excite the wonder of all who saw the splendid picnic. Politics must pay well to afford all this, but what a commentary it offers on boasted democratic simplicity and on the alleged government of the people for the people by the people.

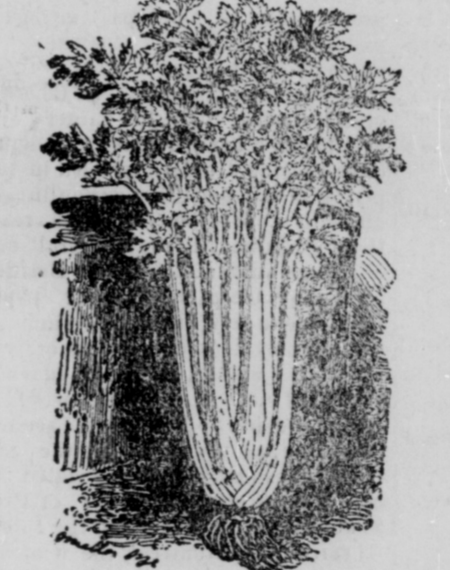
