Contract Bridge

A TRICKY HAND
 Today's deal comes from a bridge club, the committee of members writing: "A statement was made that South can make four hearts in this hand after West's opening lead of the spade king, if he plays the hand 'properly.'"

"South reached four hearts, with West putting in a spade bid. West led the spade king. Actually, South took the trick with the ace and ruffed a spade, and eventually went down one. Our question is: can South really make the contract if, in accordance with another writer's statement, he holds up on the first trick?"
 Yes, South can make four hearts if he allows West to win the first trick. West has the following options:
 He can shift to hearts. If he does, South continues to lead trumps until West takes his ace; then South can control any return (including a spade return, with the ace), draw trumps, and discard on the diamonds.
 If West continues with spades as the second trick, dummy ruffs, and South still has spade control in the ace. He leads a low club from dummy. East put up the ace to have any chance, and then his best play is a spade. South wins, leads a low diamond to the queen, and discards his last spade on the club king. South then continues without difficulty or danger.
 Perhaps the best defense, after West is allowed to hold the first trick, is for him to shift to diamonds. In that case, declarer should put up the queen from dummy and lead a club toward his own queen, as before. Again East wins, and suppose he returns a diamond. Declarer discards one spade on the club king, then ruffs a diamond or a club and ruffs a spade in dummy. He cannot be prevented from winning, in all, five of his own six heart tricks, the spade ace, two diamonds and the ace and the spade ruff in dummy is club king, a total of nine tricks, the tenth trick.
