New York Stocks Advance Fourth Week in Row

NEW YORK, Aug. 13 — (AP) — The stock market advanced last week for the fourth week in a row despite a Friday upset.

The week's rise was powered by radio-television and automobile issues and they were hit hardest in the Friday decline.

No serious damage was done Friday. Prices slipped not from heavy selling pressure but rather from reluctant demand influenced by none-too-satisfactory war news from Korea and profit-taking touched off by a sustained rise.

Corporate news — such as earnings, dividends and industry-wide developments — was probably a stronger influence during the week than at any time since United States intervention in Korea.

Monday, after the close of the market, General Motors announced a special dividend of \$2.50 a share in addition to the usual \$1.50.

The next day G. M. stock responded to heavy demand which also affected other motor issues. Automobile shares continued to rise Wednesday, wavered on Thursday and dropped rather heavily Friday.

Traders sized up the market this way: Business was booming now, would boom louder and longer for the rest of the year. The tax collector's out was going up but profits were large enough not only to satisfy the demands of war but the cries of stockholders too.

For the time being, at least, a lot of stocks looked good in relation to the dividends they have been paying and were likely to pay for the rest of 1950.

Completes Survey of Ragweed Situation

A ten-day survey of the ragweed situation in Prince Edward Island has been completed by Mr. I. J. Basset, Division of Botany and Plant Pathology, Ottawa, who reports that the percentage of the weed in this Province is much smaller than in other parts of Eastern Canada.

However, in 20 of the 70 communities of the Island visited by Mr. Basset small patches of ragweed—both the great ragweed and common ragweed species were found. Most of the places where the weed was located were near railway tracks which, he explained, was probably caused by incoming shipments of feed grains carrying the seed.

Proper control methods could rid the province completely of the menace to hay fever sufferers, Mr. Basset said. A single spraying of ragweed with 2, 4-D can eliminate the plant.

A program to eliminate the weed in the Province is being formulated.

There has been no trace of any ragweed plant found in Prince Edward Island's National Park. But the Science Division of the Federal Government has erected a ragweed pollen station atop Dalway House to see if there is any sign of pollen being carried into the area by air currents.

Ragweed plants are harmful to growing crops. They take up a great deal of space and cut down crop yields. They can also taint the milk of cows.

About 80% of hay fever cases is caused by ragweed. The pollen is spread mostly between August 1 and September 30 and can be carried by the wind up to distances of 25 miles. Railway Ass'n Issues Statement

MONTREAL, Aug. 12—The Railway Association of Canada announces that all services in Canada on the Canadian National Railways, Canadian Pacific Railway, Ontario Northland Railway, Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway, Northern Alberta Railway and Napierville Junction Railway may cease at 6 a.m. Tuesday, August 22.

J. A. Brass, general secretary of the Association, stated that all passenger, freight, express, inland and coastal shipping and ferry

services of these railways and their communications will be brought to a standstill if the railway workers go on strike.

Mr. Brass said further that the Railway Association of Canada will keep shippers and the public informed by advance notice of embargos on perishable and other traffic.
