IN MEMORIAM

MR. WILLIAM COSTELLO
The residents of Brae and vicinity were saddened to hear of the death on March 17th of one of their oldest and most respected residents in the person of Mr. William Costello, who was in his 100th year.

The deceased had always enjoyed perfect health up until about two years ago when he was confined to his bed. During that time he was never heard to complain or lose courage. A few days previous to his death he contracted pneumonia and despite medical aid and kind nursing he passed peacefully away on the above mentioned date. He was frequently visited by his beloved pastor, Rev. Father Alyward who administered to him the last rites of the Catholic Church, of which he was a devout and faithful member.

Mr. Costello was a respected citizen. He was of a quiet and generous disposition. The large number of mass cards, messages of sympathy, etc., received testified to the high esteem in which the deceased was held.

He leaves to mourn their loss of a kind and loving father—two daughters and seven sons, namely: Mrs. Dave McGaughey, Lynn, Mass.; Mrs. Charles Walsh, Brae Harbour, P. E. I.; Ambrose, Brae, Aeneas all of Brae; Peter, Charlottetown; Leg, McAdam, N. B.; William, Connecticut; and Michael, Bangor, Maine; who mourned home to attend the funeral. His wife, one daughter and two sons predeceased him.

His largely attended funeral was held on March 19th from the home of his son Ambrose, to the Immaculate Conception Church at Brae, where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Alyward, who also conducted the services at the grave. He was laid to rest in the family plot beside his wife, who predeceased him on June 17th, 1943.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. THOMAS GORRILL
The death of Mrs. Thomas Gorrill of Glenwood, Lot 8, occurred on Monday evening, April 16th at 11 P.M.

Although ill for a long time, her loved ones noted a change in her just a few days before her passing and quickly called her daughter, Mrs. Lorne Jelley, R.N., Charlottetown, who came by plane to St. Eleanor's where a car awaited to rush her to her mother's bedside on Sunday evening.

Her mother greeted her with a smile and remained conscious and smiled to those around her until late Monday afternoon when she became unconscious and peacefully passed on at 11 P.M. while her husband and family stood by.

The late Mrs. Gorrill was born in Tyne Valley, October 18, 1889, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Edward Gorrill who, a few years later, took up residence in O'Leary.

On June 20th, 1907, she became the wife of Thomas Gorrill, Glenwood, and after a honeymoon trip to the U.S.A. came with her husband to Glenwood, "an attractive bride of 17 years." Her cheerful disposition and friendly personality soon won the esteem of her neighbours which she retained through life. Keenly interested in farm life, she assisted her husband in many of his duties. Also very fond of horses, she was often seen with a steady hand on the reins as she drove her speedy chestnut to the village nine miles distant.

An ardent lover of nature's beauty, she loved to ramble down through the meadow to the woodlot, through which a brook flowed, and stroll amid the ferns and wild flowers listening to the birds sing. During her last illness, she could see from her window the frost-tinted maples inset among the evergreens and they were an inspiration to her.

She had a wonderful love for children, race or creed was no barrier and no sacrifice was too great for her to make on their behalf. She also loved to visit old folks and enjoyed their fellowship.

Early in life she sought and found her saviour whose fellowship she enjoyed throughout her sojourn. Her sympathy for the under-privileged was almost a passion. She belonged to two W.M.S.'s and her prayers followed her gifts. She was never too busy to return thanks and ask guidance for the day. Many retain pleasant memories of evenings spent at her home when singing songs turned to prayer and praise and her strong clear voice was always heard. Few have gone through so many years of affliction but when she smiled through her tears, we knew His grace was sufficient.

Her funeral was held from her late residence on Thursday, April 19th, and despite the condition of the roads a very large crowd gathered to pay their respects to one who was a friend to all. Service was conducted by Rev. Blair Colborne, Springfield West, assisted by Rev. C. O. Howlett, O'Leary, Mr. Owen Underwood, O'Leary and Rev. John Sheen, Elmisdale, who brought a very comforting message. Hymns sung were: "The Lord's My Shepherd", "Safe in the Arms of Jesus", and a trio composed of Mr. and Mrs. Dan MacPherson and Mrs. Dan MacPherson sang nicely "Shall We Meet Beyond the River" and "We'll Never Grow Old".
