Two, what the sport scribes like to term "crosshairs" series will get underway today in New York and Boston as the Yankees play host to the Cleveland Indians and the Red Sox entertain Chicago. Both of the best teams will no doubt be making the invaders' visits as unpleasant as possible, preferably by taking a clean sweep of the series. This doesn't figure though, because the Yankees have been having their gloves full handling the second division clubs and the Pale Hoosiers are just about the hottest thing that the windy city has seen since a cocked crow over an oil lamp some years ago.

Which brings us to the question of how come the White Sox are holding down top spot in the American League. They have no business being there, at least not in August. Every baseball fan in North America and elsewhere knows that the Sox always take a tallspin in June and by August are usually kicking their heels to ward off the nips of the Tigers and their ilk in the second division.

According to reports at the beginning of the season they would be running along in the race just to pace the Indians and the Yankees to the pennant, and to provide a thrill here and there early in the year. No one, or a very few, ventured to predict a real fight from them and most relegated them to their accustomed spot in third place.

Yet here they are in early August holding down first place and giving every indication that they intend to stay there. Take a good look at their lineup. Their main asset is a Yankee cast-off, Walt Dropo never really had a good season in the big leagues, after his outstanding rookie year with the Red Sox; Nellie Fox is a professional singles hitter and his double play partner Chico Carresquel has reportedly become indifferent in his play; George Kell was a great ball player in his day but he is well into his thirties; the outfield is fast but there are no Mickey Mantles or Larry Dobsys there.

If the Sox do stave off the other four teams and win the American League flag, the sports pages will be filled with dire predictions of what will happen to them in the world series against Brooklyn, Snider, Campanella, Newcombe and Co. will be licking their chops at the prospect of the biggest slice of the juicy series melon, and a world title, a thrill they have yet to feel and a salad they have yet to taste. We wouldn't be surprised though if the White Sox, despite their apparently weak hitting lineup, would prove just as unfathomable to the Dodgers as they have been to the Yankees and Indians.

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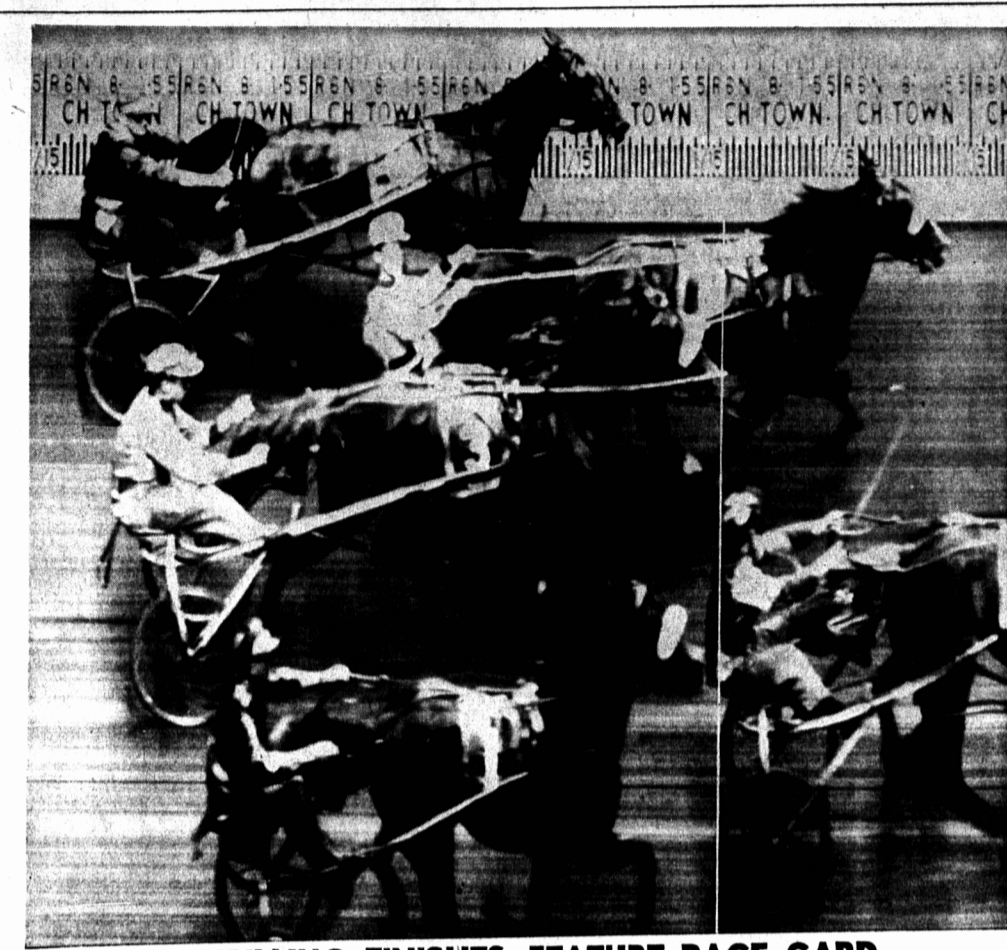

NEW YORK (AP)—The taut American League pennant race hits another of its crucial junctures today when the four closely-bunched contenders collide in head-to-head series.

Chicago White Sox, holding a single game lead over New York and Cleveland, invade Boston for three games with the sizzling Red Sox. The Yankees and Indians tangle at Yankee Stadium, also in the first of three games.

Two weekend developments intensified interest in the knock-drag-out battles of the league's up-race.

The White Sox lost the services of their ace righthander, Dick Donovan, who underwent an appendicitis operation which will keep him out of action possibly for the rest of the season.

Cleveland moves into New York with a new bit of pitching insurance—38-year-old Sal Maglie, the old "Barber" of New York Giants.

Maglie's shift to the American League champions for a reported \$25,000 after being waived out of the National League provided a shock for baseball followers.

He also plans to race in a 32-mile swim across Lake Ontario Sept. 5.

NEW YORK (AP)—Tony Trabert's back miseries were diagnosed as nothing more than a pulled muscle Monday and the fluctuating United States Davis Cup stock took an upward jump.

Trabert, America's No. 1 star, was taken to the hospital by cup captain Bill Trabert and the top orthopedic surgeons on the staff went over him.

"Nothing serious," was the announcement. "Just a pulled muscle. He'll need some rest."

"That he'll get plenty of," said the happy Trabert when he heard the verdict. "He will be at my home this week and will make a daily trip to the hospital for treatment. In addition, he will use heating pads a couple of times a day on his own."

The challenge round is scheduled Aug. 26-28—less than a month away—at Forest Hills and Trabert must return to competition well before that if he is to be in top playing trim.

The 24-year-old Wimbledon champion from Cincinnati, who has been riding a sizzling victory streak, defaulted to Eddie Moylan of Trenton, N. J., Sunday in the first set of their final match in the Meadow Club invitation at Southampton, N. Y.
