M.C.A. Protests U.S.A.F. Freighting

OTTAWA, (CP)—Maritime Central Airways, a firm based at Moncton, N.B., Wednesday, criticized United States Air Force cargo-carrying operations in Canada.

A resolution prepared for presentation at the annual meeting of the Air Industries and Transport Association decried the U. S. A. F. practice of flying supplies and materials into Labrador for the joint Canada-U. S. "Pine Tree" project. The project is a string of radar stations under construction across Canada's northland.

Construction materials are being ferried by USAF planes. Maritime Central, which does charter flying into Labrador and is one of the oldest aviation companies in Canada, said in its resolution that the Canadian government has "failed to provide adequate protection for Canadian operators against encroachment by the USAF in the field of commercial transportation."

J. A. Wells, Ottawa representative of MCA in an interview gave this example: This week, Maritime Central had an order to fly 50 tons of steel from Moncton to Frobisher Bay, Baffin Land. The order was cancelled. Mr. Wells said the U. S. A. F. is planning to fly the steel. "They not only took our order away from us," Mr. Wells said, "they also have asked if they can borrow our loading gear to help them get the steel on their planes."

Awarded Damages After Operation

MONTREAL, (CP)—A superior court judge Wednesday awarded \$1,037 to a former English sailor for damages suffered as a result of a surgical swab being left in his abdomen following an operation. John Thomas King sued Dr. H. M. Elder of Montreal for \$15,000. When the doctor died, his heirs became responsible. Mr. Justice Maurice Lalonde said failure to remove the swab amounted to negligence by Dr. Elder. King entered hospital here Nov. 16, 1948, and underwent a three-hour operation. Following his return to England he said he began to feel sharp pain and was operated upon by a surgeon there. A swab was found in his abdomen.

Lunch committees are Mrs. Howard Waite, Mrs. Lester Jonstone, Mrs. Charles MacNeill and Mrs. Ivan Sentner.

Trinity Credit Union Holds Annual Meeting

—With the president, Mr. Keir Duggan presiding, the fifth annual meeting of the Trinity Credit Union Limited in Summerside was held last evening in the Epworth Hall.

The financial statement submitted by the treasurer, Mr. Harry Bishop, showed that as of September 30th shares amounted to \$17,700.73 while loans were \$17,395.49. Following discussion the meeting approved the board of directors' recommendation in declaring a 2 per cent dividend on shares. A comparative statement showed that membership in the past year had increased from 88 to 98 while assets had increased from \$12,129.92 to \$18,585, being an increase of 68 per cent.

In his report as president, Mr. Keir Duggan noted that eight regular monthly meetings were held and that the credit union office had been open every Monday night throughout the year. This report recommended that the practice of re-electing officers be reduced to a minimum, and that vacancies be filled from the regular membership as much as possible.

A recommendation suggesting that the credit committee be increased to four members, was later adopted by the meeting chair. The supervisory committee's report submitted by the chairman William Stevenson said that this committee had conducted monthly audits of the cash account and general ledger, and two complete half yearly audits. The report stated that the treasurer and assistant treasurer are bonded and Cuna Insurance is carried on share capital, and both death and disability insurance is carried on loans.

On savings this insurance provides an amount of insurance equal to the amount of the shares. On loans it wipes out the loan in the event of death or even partial disability of the borrower. The report of the credit committee submitted by the acting chairman Dr. H. E. Clark said that during the year there were 37 applications for loans and 37 loans had been made totalling \$12,000.00. At present, he said, there are 45 loans in force totalling \$17,395.49. Four new members were elected to the board of directors. They are William Stevenson, Elmer Moore, Alan Wedlock, and Marven Wylie. Other members of the board are Keir Duggan, Harry Bishop, Harold Rodd, Rev. C. D. Matheson, and Dr. B. F. Hunter.

O. D. E. two years ago and proved to be a successful and colorful event.

The members of the C. P. A. were agreed in their desire to stimulate interest in Summerside property owners in the cultivation of flowers, the beautification of the town in general and the individual properties in particular. As a safety measure for the protection of motorists and pedestrians, the Association approved a resolution to the Town Council requesting control on the maximum height of hedges etc, to eliminate blind corners and at driveways.
