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Prince MP Discusses Pearson's Que. Speech

SUMMERSIDE — Reassuring speeches by Dr. Orville Phillips, MP for Prince County and Ray Bagnall, national vice-president of the Conservative party for Prince Edward Island, headlined a Young Progressive Conservative meeting held at the Tartan Restaurant last night with the East Prince YPC president, Lyman Arsenault, presiding.

More than 100 Conservative party enthusiasts attended the event and remained for the entertainment which followed the formal meeting.

Dr. Phillips opened his remarks by praising the fine attendance especially when the poor weather was taken into consideration.

The Prince County Member of Parliament spoke on some aspects of the Liberal Party's platform and particularly made reference to a speech made recently in Quebec by Lester Pearson in which the opposition leader stated that the federal government should gradually relinquish all control and aid in projects shared jointly by provincial and federal governments, and allow the local governments to pay for the projects with funds obtained through the levying of a provincial income tax.

Dr. Phillips enumerated many of the projects on this island that would be affected if this

plan were put into effect, including the road to resources project, which has seen six and one half million dollars spent to date, hospital insurance plans, many social security plans such as blindness and disability pensions, and education projects such as the vocational high school being built in Summerside.

The speaker expressed doubt that a provincial income tax could pay for all these projects. In mentioning the itinerary announced by the opposition leader, Dr. Phillips remarked that he had "completely ignored Prince Edward Island, once again."

Mr. Bagnall spoke briefly on the many speeches that have been made leading up to the next federal election and especially noted that while the Liberals have been complaining about the ferry service for many car ferries when the Liberals came into power as when they went out.

Education Is Said First Need Today

Three guest speakers discussed careers and opportunities for youth at the January meeting of the Birchwood Home and School Association held at the school last evening.

Dr. J.A. MacMillan spoke on the need for professional training and of professional people in the modern world, while A.D. Cameron discussed the positions of skilled and unskilled labor. Rev. E.J. Roche outlined the opportunities available for financial assistance through bursaries, scholarships, grants and loans.

Dr. MacMillan stated that there is no unemployment in professional fields, and that a student entering the professions needed only sufficient practical application and the desire to attend school for a reasonable length of time. He outlined the positions available in the health field, emphasizing the tremendous need for all professionally trained persons, and urged the parents to advise their children to consider entering these fields.

A. D. Cameron demonstrated the relationship between unemployment and insufficient education, stating that two thirds of the unemployed in 1955 had less than grade eight education.

CITY GETS HOSE DRYER

The first of two hose drying units for the city fire department arrived yesterday. The two units will have drying capacity for 1,000 feet of hose in a few hours. The present method of hose drying,

stretching the hose on sloping racks, requires about a week of drying time. Removal of the old racks will also make valuable space available on the apparatus floor. Chief engineer Alfred Frizzell is seen above

as he puts one length of hose on one of the 10 shelves of the unit. A heater forces hot air up from the bottom of the dryer and a fan at the top carries it away, creating a continuous flow of hot air through and around the hose.

Provision Of Nursing Care Said Concern Of Profession

"The greatest concern of nurses is the provision of that degree and amount of nursing care which the patient requires, whether this patient is in the hospital setting or in his own home," Miss Margaret MacLean, RN, MSc, nursing consultant, health insurance, National Department of Health and Welfare, Ottawa said last night.

Miss MacLean was speaking to a meeting of the Association of Nurses of Prince Edward Island held at the nurses' residence of the Prince Edward Island Hospital.

The meeting was presided over by the president, Miss Ida MacKay, who introduced the guest speaker.

Speaking on "Optimum Nursing Care," Miss MacLean noted that as the nurses assist the physician in diagnosis and treatment measures, they should consider the nursing care plan for the individual patient.

"This is not to imply that the nurse herself can provide for all their needs. She is a specialist in nursing care, but she can draw on the special skills and knowledge of the social worker, the clergyman, the

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Inspection Made Of Hillcrest Units

SUMMERSIDE — A brief, informal inspection of one of the seven completed units at the new Hillcrest housing development was carried out yesterday

afternoon by air force officers and representatives of the primary and sub-contractors.

The unofficial inspection consisted of a check of what the air force families could expect when they take residence shortly, such as the inside finish, steel windows and sashes and other work new to this particular project.

The RCAF station was represented by Sqdn. Ldr. E. Semple, chief administration officer; FO Gerhard Damm, operations officer, and Ted Farrell, housing

officer. Donald Gould, foreman for Eastern Woodworkers represented the primary contractors while other representatives from the sub-contractors were also in the inspecting party.

It's officially reported that air force families will take up residence in the first seven units next Wednesday.

The remaining units of the 200 under construction are expected to be ready for occupancy at the rate of five per week.

D. J. Mullin To Be Candidate For Mayor In S'side Election

SUMMERSIDE — D.J. Mullin, a retired resident of Summerside, intends to offer as candidate for the office of mayor in the forthcoming civic election it was reported yesterday.

Mayor W.A. Currie's tenure of office ends this year and he has not officially stated whether he intends to renominate for a fourth term.

Mr. Mullin, a native of St. Peters, served two terms on the board of commissioners of that village as well as being justice of peace for several years.

He taught at Souris High School after graduating from Prince of Wales College with a first class teachers license, and

later at Queen's Square School, Charlottetown and in his home at St. Peters.

He later attended St. Dunstan's and Mount Allison universities and at one period was supervisor of schools for Kings County.

After retiring from the teaching profession he devoted his attention to farming, especially dairying and the breeding of registered cattle.

Three sons served in the Second World War. Daniel, a navigator in the RCAF was killed over Germany in 1943. Mercier of Summerside served in Europe and Korea and his youngest son, Owen, is mayor of Burlington, Ont.
