

Russia Agrees To Geneva Talks

MOSCOW (Reuters)—Russia has notified the West she agrees with proposals to hold a "summit" meeting in Geneva, Switzerland, next month, but indicated she will not discuss the status of East European satellite states or the European activities of international communism.

Acceptance of the Western invitation to a meeting of the heads of the Big Four governments in Geneva, opening July 18, was announced in a 250-word note delivered Monday to the British, American and French embassies. The West suggested the dates July 18-21. Russia's formal agreement was to the opening date, but left undecided the duration of the conference.

MAY EXTEND MEETING

Western observers here think Russia may try, when the conference opens, to propose an extension of the time of the meeting, presumably in an effort to move deeply into some problems at the "summit" stage.

Electrocuted Seeking To Rescue Raccoon

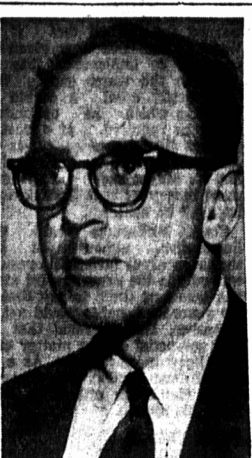
