78 Escape Uninjured In Lobster Factory Boiler Blast

The main steam boiler at the Tignish Fisheries factory blew up Saturday with a terrific report. 53 women and 25 men engaged in cannine lobsters in the building were fortunately uninjured.

A steam pressure of 125 pounds quickly filled the premises with steam making it difficult for the staff to make their way outside. The plant was immediately shut down and all lobsters on hand sold to outside buyers.

As the procuring and installation of a new steam boiler of the required size is an extensive task it seemed for a time that the cannery would be out of operation for the season.

The factory manager, William Shea got in touch with Eugene Gorman of Charlottetown who immediately sent Mr. Benjamin Livingstone, an expert welder from the Charlottetown Industries Limited and his assistant Elmer MacKenna.

A large patch measuring 25 x 24 was welded into the boiler in a fine piece of repair work. The job was started Sunday at noon and finished about midnight. Mr. Livingstone said it was the largest patch he had welded into a boiler in thirty-five years at his trade. The tasks of canning the daily catch from sixty-two lobster boats will be resumed at the factory today.

Kensington Council Hears Plans For Sewage System

At the Kensington Town Council meeting last night, Mayor Everett Champion reported that Mr. W.H. Crandall consulting engineer had advised him that he would be in Kensington Thursday May 15th, to discuss the proposed sewage disposal system.

Correspondence received from Mr. Crandall states that he hoped to have tenders out in time for work to be started by June 1st.

Coun. Elmer Paynter suggested the possibility of householders refusing to hook up with the sewage disposal system and other councillors had queries on the subject. Mayor Champion said that certain regulations set down in the statutes found in the P.E.I. Town Act could be incorporated into a by-law which would take care of the matter.

Clean-up week was set for the week of May 19 to 24th. The street committee was requested to attend to necessary cleaning of the streets, also painting white lines on streets and parking spaces. Rubbish cans are to be placed and used.

Numerous complaints of dogs running at large and destroying gardens were heard and the by-law concerning dogs is to be more strictly enforced.

The property committee was authorized by the Mayor to have the town dump cleaned.

Several councillors suggested their intention to attend the Mayors and Municipalities convention at Civic Auditorium, Summerside today.

Albertain Council Asks Gov't. Aid In Street Project

At the regular Albertain Town Council meeting last night Mayor Herbert Matthews announced that a resolution had been forwarded requesting assistance from the Provincial Treasurer and the Dept. of Highways for the resurfacing of an half mile and paving of one mile of streets in the town of Albertain.

Considerable discussion was held regarding the generally poor condition of the town streets and it is planned to have the clay roads scraped and the larger holes filled in the pavement.

Councillor Travers reported that the Fire Dept. had been out burning grass on three occasions and planned to attend to several other fire hazards areas shortly.

Mr. W. W. Currie, chairman of the Albertain Public Library committee, attended the meeting with a request for assistance from the town in reducing an outstanding debt on the library. Councillors Carpenter, Travers and Jeffery were in attendance.
