Fire Equipment For Villages At a meeting of the Association of Village Commissioners held in the Court House Building at Charlottetown yesterday, the President, Mr. John Myrick, Jr., of Tignish, was elected to wait on Premier Matheson and enquire into the possibility of purchasing fire hose and minor equipment collectively through the Government.

At the morning session, Mr. T. A. Campbell, Provincial Fire Marshal, gave an interesting and instructive talk on fire prevention and the accepted methods of fire fighting in small areas, with particular reference to villages such as were represented at the meeting.

The proposed constitution and by-laws of the recently formed organization were discussed and adopted. Regular meetings are to be held yearly in May and December, the former being agreed to as the Annual meeting at which the election of officers will take place. The Executive will consist of two commissioners from each of the three counties in the province, and a chairman.

It was pointed out at the meeting that the Commissioners represented six thousand persons in the villages they were elected to speak for within the scope of their duties.
