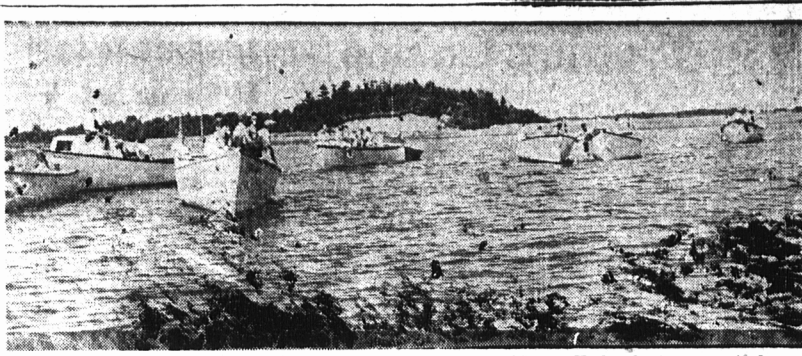

Laurie Herring, Murray Harbor won the light 6-cylinder for his third victory in this class in as many years over the class of four entries.

The 4-cylinder, the first race of the day, gave the fans their first thrill with a close finish between David and Harry Irving of Murray Harbor North. Harry took an early lead, but on the second turn David moved in close to the pole to cut down the lead and gradually pull abreast. Close to the finish line with a burst of speed he won the event and the applause of the crowd.

"During an electrical storm I noticed a ball of light flash across the sky," he said. "It seemed to be actually zig-zagging among lightning bolts. It was, or seemed to be, about the size of a dinner plate, and with what looked like flame trailing behind."

"Whether this was one of the fabled 'flying saucers' I read about, or just a queer-shaped ball of lightning, I can't say."

Earlier, a similar sight was reported from Digby, N.S., where a man told of watching a speeding object which avoided a storm centre as though controlled by a pilot.

Washington reported recently that radar screens picked up unknown objects flying over the U. S. capital.

Silver Disks Seen Over New England

BOSTON, July 23—(AP)—Flying objects described as silver disks were reported sighted over New England last night and early today.

At Nahant Coast Guard station, seaman Henry Arnpriester said he sighted two disks flying at about 2,000 feet which slowly circled above the station and headed back to sea.

In West Newfield, Charles Buck reported he sighted three "silver, disk-like" objects flying southwest at a "very high altitude."
