ABANDONED AT SEA.—A telegram received by Hon. D. Davies, last night, reports that his brig—the *Harry Davies*—while on passage from this port to Barbados, W. I., was abandoned at sea. The crew were landed at New York yesterday. The *Harry Davies* sailed from this port on the 10th ult. with a cargo consisting of 300 qtls. of dry fish, 900 sacks of white oats, 80 bbls. mackerel, 75 do herring, 70 do potatoes, 50 cases canned provisions, 50 do. lobsters, 10 horses, 100 sheep, and 16 geese, shipped by Hon. D. Davies; and 1,500 sacks white oats, shipped by R. Holman, Esq., of Summerside.

THE market was well stocked to-day with seasonable supplies. Sales brisk as follows: Beef (small) from 5 to 10 cents per lb; beef (qc) from 5 to 6 cents per lb.; mutton, from 4 to 8 cents per lb.; lamb, from 4 to 8 cents per lb.; pork (per lb.) from 6 to 9 cents; pork (per carcass) from 5 to 6 cents; geese, from 40 to 50 cents each; ducks, from 20 to 25 cents each; chickens, from 30 to 45 cents per pair; butter (fresh) from 14 to 15 cents per lb.; butter (tub) from 13 to 14 cents per lb.; eggs, from 16 to 18 per doz.; potatoes, from 16 to 20 cents per bushel; oats, from 33 to 34 cents per bushel; hay, from 35 to 40 cents per 100 lbs.; flour, from \$3.00 to \$3.25 per 100 lbs.; oatmeal, from \$2.50 to \$2.75 per 100 lbs.

THE steamer "Carroll" sailed for Boston yesterday with a cargo consisting of 2342 barrels mackerel, 1048 barrels and 2734 bushels potatoes, 475 cases eggs, 222 drums dry fish, 195 boxes canned meat, 80 barrels hake and 8 barrels calveskins, and 5 tubs of butter. THE Schr. "Eugene McMillan," from Newfoundland bound to Charlottetown, struck on the Indian Rocks, off Wood Islands, on Saturday night last; was condemned on Monday, advertised to be sold "for the benefit of all concerned" on Wednesday last. Before the sale came off, however, we learn that several of the residents of Wood Islands, observing the vessel afloat on Tuesday morning before the sale, went out to her with boats, found her abandoned and stripped. They took charge of the schooner, and after pumping her about eight hours, they succeeded in towing her to the Wood Islands Breakwater, where they moored her safely, and she is now in their possession. It is rumored that sufficient cause did not exist for abandoning this vessel, as the only damage to her seems to be a leakage of a somewhat suspicious nature.
