Rev. H. E. D. Ashford preached the sermons at both the morning and evening services. Subject for the morning services was "The United Church Looks Back" and in the evening "The United Church Dares to Look Ahead."

With fine weather prevailing, hundreds of people accepted the invitation of the R.C.A.F. to visit the Summerside station on Saturday, Air Force Day.
