LEARNING AT A DISCOUNT.—On some new railroad work in Germany it has come to light that a considerable number of the hands had been educated in the universities. There were so many of them in one gang that it went under the name of "the Philosophers' shift." In another gang not far from these, a Protestant clergyman who visited the men in their barracks found two fellow-clergymen among them; and a Catholic priest found a workman who had studied theology with him.

CUT HIS OWN SALARY.—Mayor Quincy, of Boston, says that in pursuance orders issued for a reduction in the salaries of all city departments he will set the example and perform the duties of Mayor at a reduction of seven and one half per cent from the schedule. The salary is \$10,000, but will work for \$9,250. Police salaries will not be affected by the order, as the mayor has no control over them. The salaries of firemen will be cut. Nearly 5,000 employees out of a total of 10,000 are affected by the mayor's order, and he expects to save \$200,000 by reducing salaries.

WELL DONE CANADA.—It is pointed out in a recent despatch from Washington that according to Consul Brush of Clifton, Canada, the output of gold from the Klondike and British Columbia has raised Canada to the fifth place in the list of gold-producing countries. While the United States shows an increased output for 1898, it is still second to the Transvaal. According to the latest figures the five leading gold-producing countries for 1898 are as follows: Transvaal, \$73,476,600; United States, \$64,300,000; Australia, \$61,480,763; Russia, \$25,136,994; Canada, \$14,190,000.

A NEWSPAPER WITHOUT TYPE.—A typeless newspaper has just been produced at Brussels. The compositors of the world paper Petit Blue, had struck. The news accompanying sixteen pages of illustrations was set on a typewriter. Then the single type written sheets and the pictures were pasted on sheets of cardboard larger than the size of the newspaper. Then the whole was reduced by photography to the actual size. A print was made from the negative on a sensitized sheet of zinc. With the aid of nitric acid, the type and illustrations were etched in, and the result was a complete solid form, ready for the press.
