THE CROPS.

Recent rains and warm weather have wonderfully improved the appearance and prospects of the crops throughout this province. Hay has thickened at the bottom, and though the yield will still be light, there will be considerably more for use next winter than was anticipated a month ago. The present prospects in respect to grain and roots are good; and if nothing untoward should happen, the crop of 1900 will be, upon the whole, unusually large.

A TEST APPLIED.

THE Liberal reply to all the charges against the Government is: "This country is prosperous. This is the growing time. See how our trade is increasing." But the Montreal Star shows, by reference to the official statistics, that in the 18 years of Conservative rule ending with June 30, 1896, the percentage of increase in Canadian exports was nearly twice as great as the percentage of increase in American exports during the same period, 52 per cent for Canada as compared with 27 per cent for the United States. But in the four years of Liberal rule ending June 30, 1900, the percentage of increase in Canadian exports was less than the percentage of increase of American exports during the same period, about 45 per cent for Canada as compared with about 58 per cent for the United States. The Star concludes that if the value of exports is the best criterion of prosperity and progress Canada was steadily gaining on the United States during the 18 years of Conservative rule, while during the four years of Liberal rule it has steadily fallen behind the United States.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Who is acting minister of railways. La Prairie says Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The Toronto Gate says Mr. Sutherland?

Doctor Landerkin used to pose as the wit of the Liberal party in the House of Commons. He has had the wit to announce that he will not seek re-election.

The Liberals promised to make Canada a cheap country to live in. Have they kept their promise? If you think they have look over your living expenses and compare prices with what they were four years ago.

It is thought that it will be August before the international column can start on a 4-7 or 80 miles march from Pien to P. K. This leaves but slim hope that relief can be brought to the legations from outside in time.

President Whitney, of the Dominion Coal Company, has notified the stockholders that, to provide funds for the increasing business, 10,000 shares of preferred stock at \$110 per share are to be issued.

It is reported that there has been found in London a letter written by Gladstone which leads to the belief that the only reason the former premier did not accept a title was because he insisted upon becoming the Earl of Liverpool, which was successfully opposed by the Jenkinson family.

A special court will be formed to try the rebels who in Cape Colony rose to aid the Boer republics. When the war is over these men will have a chance to learn how foolish they were. As beaten enemies the burghers of the Free State and the Transvaal will go free; as rebels those of Cape Colony will go to trial. While the punishment of the rank and file is not likely to be severe, it will yet be punishment, and punishment that is deserved.

In an address presented to the Pope's delegate, Monseigneur, Falconio, by the

parish priest of River du Loup and his parishioners, the following passage is to be read: "We are British subjects, and irrevocably loyal to the British crown." A prominent French Canadian gentleman who draws attention to the above, adds, "there are not many Bourassas in the province of Quebec."

We learn that Dr. Ferguson, Marshfield, will deliver a lecture entitled "Rambles in the Old World," in the Marshfield Hall, on Thursday evening, August 2nd, beginning at 8 o'clock. Dr. Ferguson has recently returned from an extended tour in the Old World and is peculiarly fitted for the task he has undertaken. His brilliant career as a student will no doubt secure for him a crowded house, and we feel sure that his lecture will prove both interesting and instructive.

A blue book has been issued containing the official correspondence with reference to the treatment of rebels in South Africa. It contains an interesting note by Sir Alfred Milner, British High Commissioner, estimating the number of colonists who joined the Boers at 10,000. Mr. Chamberlain, Secretary of State for the Colonies, lays down the rule that there should be no vindictiveness in the treatment of rebels, but that justice to the loyalists is the obligation of duty and honor.

Oil in Newfoundland.

PORT AU PORT, Nfld., July 24.—F. W. Andrews, Canadian oil expert, has been here prospecting for oil for the last two or three weeks. He has succeeded in locating no fewer than five wells, two of which yield some ten barrels of good oil per day. Mr. Andrews has gone to North Sydney to purchase coal and secure efficient machinery to carry on operations more extensively. Mr. Andrews is importing the machinery from Petrolia, Ontario, and it is expected when everything is ready the yield of oil will be large. There are a large number of men employed now about the works. Mr. Andrews represents a company comprising such capitalists as Van Horne, Shaughnessy, Cox and others.

Chinese and Russians.

St. PETERSBURG, July 25.—A despatch which has been received here from General Grodekoff, at Knabarovok, dated July 22, reports that the steamer Odesa, which left Chardin July 16, brought tidings of the Russian force that left Te Lin July 7, en route to Chardin. It appears that 200 men started with a large convoy of Christian Chinese women and children. After constant fighting, which was often at close quarters and with bayonet, they were again attacked by Boxers July 12. The Russians lost heavily and ran short of ammunition. At last accounts they were threatened by 15,000 Boxers.

General Grodekoff considers the situation as bad. Attacks are daily threatened and rebels and marauders are over-running Manchuria. The general says the local governors have little authority and that fanatics dominate the situation.

Chinese in the States.

CHICAGO, July 24.—A special to the Record from Honolulu, July 16, via San Francisco, says: At an open air mass-meeting Saturday evening, July 14, attended by fully 3,000 Chinese, resolutions were adopted calling on the governments of Great Britain, Japan and United States to lead the way in a movement for the restoration of Emperor Kwang Hsu, the preservation inviolate of Chinese territory and the removal of the capital from Peking to some other city less impervious to the influence of western civilization.

Tempest in the Teacup.

LONDON, July 25.—The Globe's naval correspondent at Taku writes:

"Admiral Kempff has raised a storm in a tea-cup on the salute question. He is second in command of the station and thus entitled to eleven guns as rear-admiral, and this was recently given him by the Endymion at Yokohama. He claimed 13 guns, stating that no American admiral got eleven guns, their values being: Full admiral 17; vice admiral 15; rear admiral 13. The United States, however, having just started the grade of admiral it is probable Kempff thought out the regulations in pure ignorance, as there appears to be no reason why a United States rear admiral should be worth more powder than any other rear admiral. To his protest Rear Admiral Kempff was informed that the captain of the Endymion would give him as many guns as he wanted if there was sufficient powder on the ship, but until they published their regulations we had to go by ours. The Orlando (British armored ship) arriving at Taku knew nothing of this squabble and rubbed it in by saluting the Chinese rear admiral with 13 guns, then the Russian rear admiral with 13, and then the United States rear admiral with eleven.

Whether the distance made it difficult for them to distinguish the number, or a delicate hint was intended, the Newark had the good taste to return thirteen.
