

Abegweit KO'd By Heavy Crane

BORDEN — The MV Abegweit was knocked out of action last night for about four hours when a crane being moved by flatcar tore down a cable aboard the "Abbie".

The wiring which was essential to the operation of the ferry was replaced in just under four hours.

The flatcar carrying the crane was loaded at Cape Tormentine and the accident occurred as it was being unloaded at the Borden terminal at 7:20 p.m.

The edge of the crane caught the cable which apparently had a slight sag and before the shunter crew could be alerted, the heavy wires were torn loose and severed. No one was injured.

Electricians had the wiring replaced about 11:30 and the ferry immediately started loading for a late crossing. The MV Confederation was held at Cape Tormentine until the repairs on the Abegweit had been completed as the Confederation was unable to dock in Borden while the Abegweit occupied the slip.

A new wharf is under construction at Borden at the present time to allow faster loading and unloading of Northumberland Strait ferries.

Canadian Red Cross Society Aiding Victims Of Hurricane

According to information just received by Gordon Macdonald, president of the P.E.I. Red Cross, a cash grant of \$5,000 has been made by the Canadian Red Cross Society to help hurricane victims in Tobago.

The dispatch said that the allocation was made following the receipt of a disaster report from the League of Red Cross Societies in Geneva. The League is co-ordinating the international relief effort for West Indian islands.

The Canadian Red Cross grant will assist the newly-formed Trinidad and Tobago Red Cross Society which was one of the 14 new national Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies officially recognized at the Centenary Conference in Geneva last month.

It was stated that more Canadian Red Cross financial or material assistance will be available if required.

In Prince Edward Island, Red Cross is a partner in the United Fund.

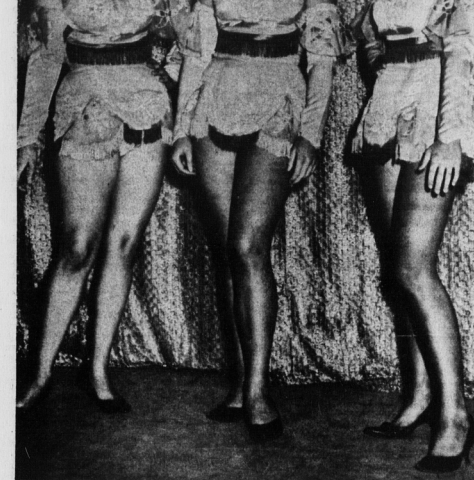

Peddler Fined For 3rd Time

SUMMERSIDE — Appearing before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County magistrate's court, on the charge of peddling merchandise without a licence, Said Kadray, Pictou, N.S., was fined \$25 and costs yesterday.

On each of the previous occasions, Kadray was fined \$20 and costs.

Loan Granted To Wellington

Capital Budget, The Guardian OTTAWA (Hon. J.R. Gardiner, minister responsible for Central Housing and Housing Corporation announced yesterday a loan in the amount of \$7,467 has been awarded to Wellington, to assist in the construction of a sewage treatment system.

The loan will aid in the construction of 600 feet of 10-inch and 200 feet of eight-inch trunk sewer and a sewage stabilization pond. Total estimated cost of the project is \$11,200.

Under part VI-B of the National Housing Act, CMHC may make a loan to a municipality to assist in the construction or expansion of a sewage treatment project.

A project must be part of an overall plan for the elimination or prevention of water or soil pollution.

For work completed in or before March 31, 1965, CMHC may forgive repayment of 25 per cent of the principal amount of the loan and 25 per cent of the interest that has accrued in respect of the loan as of the date of completion of the project.

Mr. Gardiner emphasizes that all the loans announced yesterday totalling some \$10.9 million, had been accelerated to allow construction to begin before the ground hardens and so as to permit work to continue through the winter months.

Project Is Approved

SUMMERSIDE — To be carried out under the winter works program, the installation of water and sewerage systems in the Confederation Heights housing development was approved Monday night by the St. Eleanora's village commission.

Art Hiscock, an engineer from W.H. Cranall and Associates, a consulting engineering firm from Moncton, N.B., attended the meeting and it was announced that all village owned properties will be surveyed and marked by this firm.

The firm will also investigate the feasibility of extending sewerage facilities to A and B 11 Trailer Court following a request for this service from the trailer court.

A recommendation that a nine o'clock curfew be enforced was made by the village police and the commission said it would take it under consideration.

In its report the village fire department told of being called to three fires during the month of September. It was believed the first time that the department had been called to three fires in one month.
