

# Island Resident Is Found Guilty

**SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**  
Sterling Joseph Bernard, a 24 year old Lennox Island resident was found guilty in Supreme Court here yesterday on a charge of causing bodily harm with intent to wound Roger Frank Labobe, Lennox Island. Sentencing was postponed to May 26, at 11 a.m.

At the commencement of yesterday's trial the presiding Judge Mr. Justice R.F. Bell instructed the jury to retire and bring in a verdict of not guilty on the charge against the accused of manslaughter.

Judge Bell told the jury that the reason for this was due to the evidence of Dr. Aquino, associate pathologist for P.E.I., that the cause of death could have been that of alcohol poisoning, of the fact that the accused took blood into his lungs or a combination of both factors.

After retiring for 15 minutes the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty on the manslaughter charge.

Crown prosecutor George R. McMahon presented the crown's summation of the case.

He told the jury, "taking the evidence on the whole, you will find many discrepancies, but there is no doubt Labobe was stabbed and that the knife was used by the accused. This knife was also claimed by the accused the next day."

J. Melville Campbell, defence counsel in his address to the jury stated that it was quite reasonable to conclude that if a scul-

# 5th Kings PCs Address Rally

outlined what he termed the Shaw government since 1959 in road construction and pavement. He told the meeting that the Shaw government constructed some 48 miles of road in the 1st District of Kings together with the paving of all main roads as well as most secondary roads and access roads to fishing centres.

Mr. McGowan told the meeting that the whole trend across the province is to increase support for the Shaw government on May 30.

Melvin J. McQuaid, MP, took issue with statements recently made at public meetings by some Liberal candidates which accused the Shaw government of "flagrant neglect of the farming industry." To indicate how misleading he felt these statements were Mr. McQuaid went on to point out that in 1965 agricultural farm sales were up in value more than 60 per cent, an increase of what they were the last year of the Liberal government. Net farm incomes were up by more than 70 per cent over 1959. The budget for the redepartment of agriculture in the last year of Liberal rule was \$500,000 while in 1965 it was \$1,500,000. "Does this look like neglect of agriculture? I say not."

Mr. McQuaid also dealt with the expanding of the fisheries industry.
