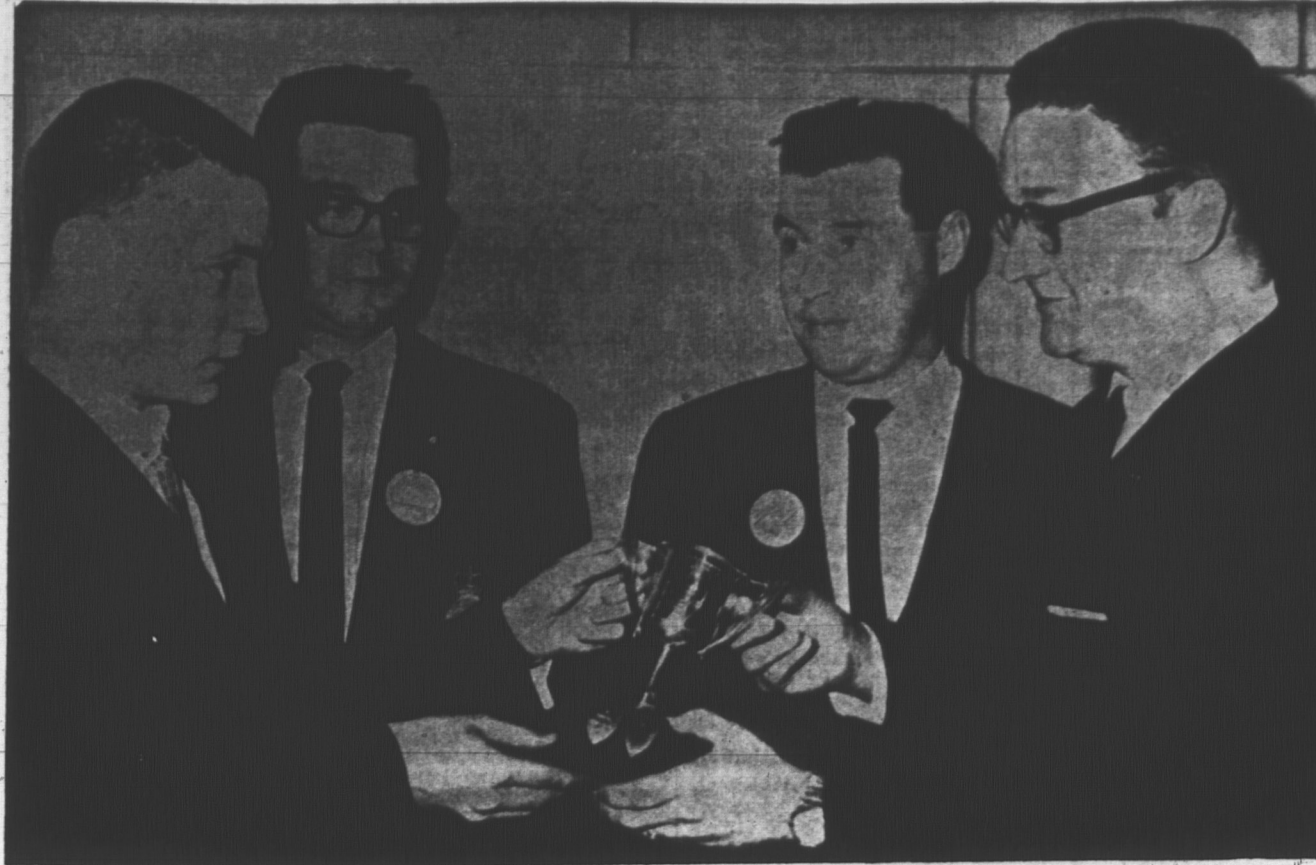
S. Vietnamese Press Offensive

Six Sisters, St. Mary's Tie For Day's Top Mark

The fourth day of the P.E.I. Music Festival came to a climax here last evening with a family of six sisters singing a selection "Twilight Shadows" that won them a high mark of 86.

This was only the second time during the day-long competition that such a high mark had been awarded. Earlier in the afternoon, a chorus from St. Mary's Academy was awarded a similar mark for its rendition of a French number entitled "Gai-Lon-La".

Adjudicator Frances Cameron expressed his appreciation of the song rendered by the six Jenkins sisters, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Jenkins of Summerside.

Commenting on their performance he said "you sing together as if you have no trouble agreeing together all the time."

This is the third year that the sisters have appeared as a group. Each time they have captured a higher mark than their previous year's performance. The first time they were awarded a mark of 84, the second year a mark of 85 and this year, 86.

The festival resumes this morning at 9 o'clock at both Elm Street School and the Civic Auditorium. Adjudicators will be Eric C. Lewis at the auditorium and Mr. Cameron at Elm Street.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says milder air gave more spring-like temperatures to most Maritime communities Thursday. Mid afternoon temperatures reached into the 60s in parts of New Brunswick and western Nova Scotia while readings of 54 were reported from Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton.

A weather system over Hudson Bay is forecast to move toward the Gulf of St. Lawrence today. This will mean more cloud for Cape Breton and Prince Edward Island than for other regions. Near the waters of the gulf, some showers should be expected as the system approaches.

Colder air will push southward Saturday bringing cloudy skies to all regions.

Regional forecasts:

Cape Breton, Prince Edward Island: Cloudy with a few sunny periods during morning; showers in the late afternoon and evening; little change in temperatures; southwesterly winds 30.

Low-high at Sydney and Charlottetown 32 and 53.

Outlook for Saturday—Cloudy; a little colder.

High tide today at Charlottetown 10.55 a.m. and 11.33 p.m. At Rustico at 5.50 a.m. and 7.07 p.m. Summerside tide eighteen minutes later than Charlottetown. Sun rises today at 6.15 a.m. and sets at 8.06 p.m. All times ADT.

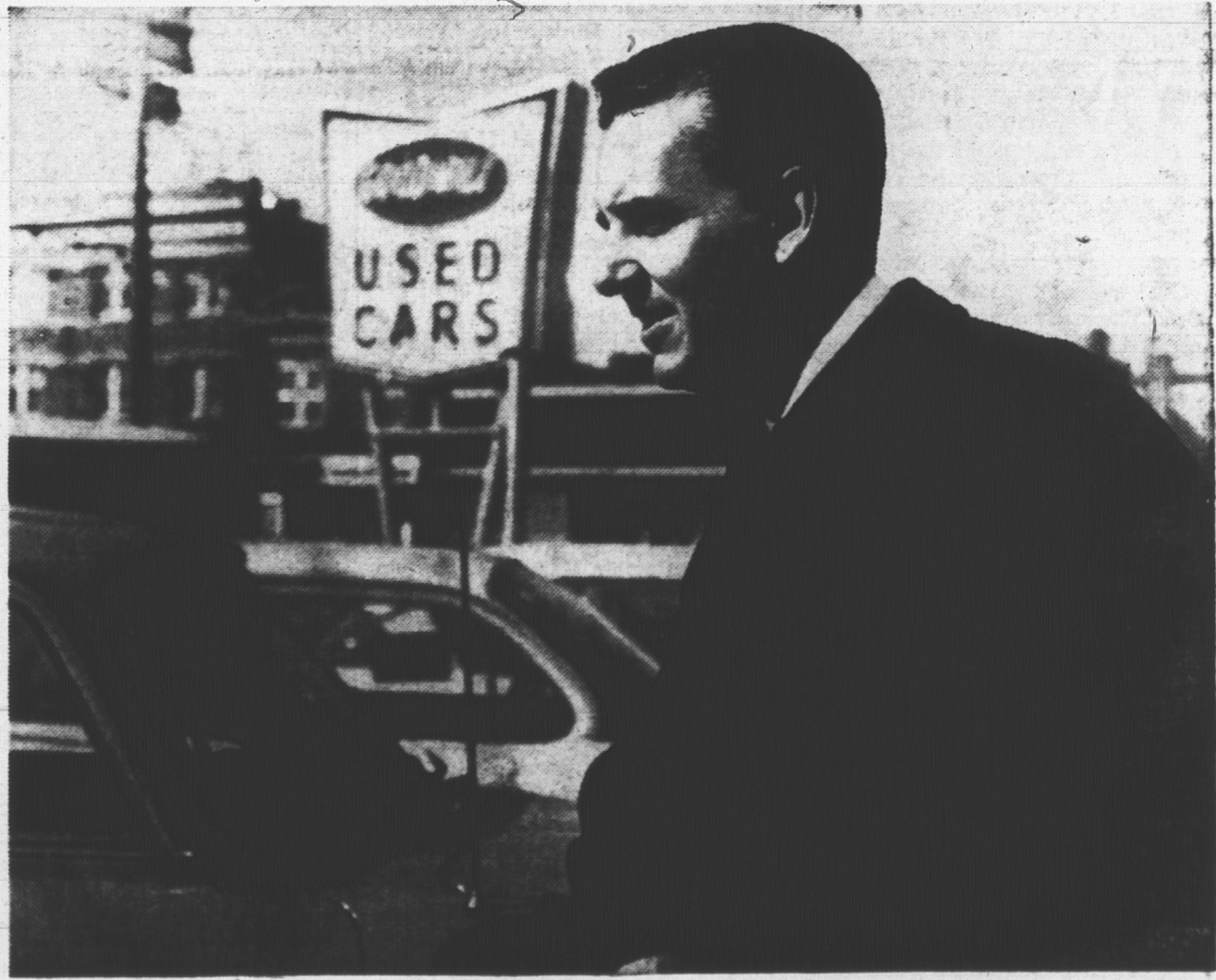
