He was a very learned man, revised the Latin translation of the Gospels, translated the other books of the New Testament from the Greek, and the Old Testament from the Hebrew into Latin, anno 405. He was also the author of epistles, commentaries and biographies.

114 years ago, to-day, George Whitefield died; he founded the "Calvinistic Methodists." He was the most eloquent preacher of his day, and preached 18,000 sermons during his career of 34 years. He three times visited America, viz., in 1737, 1739 and 1744.

DAIRY THIEVES.—The dairy of Mrs. Theophilus DesBrissay, Spring Park, was entered last night or early this morning by thieves, and a quantity of butter, cream and milk stolen therefrom. The rascals, or rascal, had evidently tried to force open the lock, but failing in this, the lower panel of the door was actually cut out, and an entrance thereby effected.

Halloran. The Bonavista sailed at 1.30.

"TEN steps in the right direction," was the verdict about Charlottetown by a chronic punster the other day. He remarked that if you wished to judge rightly of a community, look at their doorsteps. They are a good gauge for every other feature of order and prosperity. Are they neat, well in place, clean, and in harmony with the true value of their uses? Then you may feel sure that the same characteristics can be found elsewhere. If, on the contrary, they are shattered, dilapidated and frost-moved, without replacement and repair, you may be sure that things generally have got displaced and are in need of repair. The doorsteps of Charlottetown are everywhere "gadding abroad," from the lowest slanty clean up to the COLONIAL BUILDING, and both include.

REPORTS from all fishing centres in Newfoundland are most discouraging. From the northern part of Labrador, where great numbers of fishing craft had gone, doubtful accounts are received. Out of 700 vessels, only 109 returned with full fares, 200 with half, and 400 had not taken 100 quatsals each. At the Straits of Belle Isle and on the French shore the fisheries have been a total failure, while at White Bay great distress is already prevailing, and the inhabitants are threatened with starvation during the coming winter unless the government comes to the rescue. Gloomy reports are coming in from every quarter. Not since 1869 have the fisheries proved such a failure. Present prospects indicate a disastrous failure of the fisheries this year, which will undoubtedly throw a large number of supply merchants into bankruptcy.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.]

The Sculling Match.

BOSTON, Sept. 29. About 3,000 persons were at Point of Pines to-day to witness the sculling contest between Wallace Ross and John Teemer, postponed from last Saturday. The stakes were a purse of \$2,000. Ross was given a start of five seconds. The men were in line at 5.22 p. m., and forty seconds later the word was given to Ross, and five seconds later to Teemer. Ross was fully three lengths to the fore, when Teemer went off at thirty strokes to the minute. In twenty strokes Teemer had lessened the lead by half a length and continued to gain on Ross. When the 3^d stake was rounded, Ross was leading by only half a length—here both squared away for home and Teemer did splendid work passing Ross, who struggled hard and winning by two boat lengths.

Siege of Khartoum.

LONDON, Sept. 29. The Times publishes telegrams via Kassa and Massawah, giving extracts from the diary of a Khartoum correspondent, describing the siege of the latter place, from April 28th to July 31st:— "There was daily fighting which at times was terrific. Gen. Gordon's total loss during that time was 700 killed. The General despaired of receiving adequate relief. The negroes were the only troops who could be relied upon. On April 27, the enemy captured one of Gordon's armed steamers.

Military Action.

LONDON, Sept. 29. A despatch to the Times from Hong Kong says the French stopped and searched the English trading steamer Fuhkito and Hailong, in Formosa channel. This action has caused great irritation. The fact that neutral steamers are conveying soldiers and munition of war to various quarters, will probably be a source of complication in view of Admiral Espes's recent action in connection with a German ship.

Fatal Railway Collision.

WHEELING W., Va., Sept. 28. This afternoon the B. & O. Railroad Express train from Baltimore for Chicago, and a local freight collided, killing two passengers and injuring many, some, no doubt fatally.

The Cholera.

ROME, Sept. 29. There have been fifty-two new cases of cholera and twenty-six deaths, reported at Geneva during the past twenty-four hours ending at noon to-day. The scourge is raging in all the outlying villages.

The New Lord Mayor.

LONDON, Sept. 29. George Swan Nottage, Esq., Alderman for Cardwainer Ward, was elected Lord Mayor of London to-day.

Peace.

TIENTSIN, Sept. 29. It is reported that the Empress of China has decided to conclude peace with France.
