POTTERY.—The sale of the P. E. Island Pottery on Wednesday next, at noon, offers a rare chance to those wishing to start in business. This Pottery was started seven or eight years ago. It had many difficulties to overcome but succeeded. To-day it manufactures a ware which competes successfully with foreign make for the Island trade. The ground covers an area of about five acres, the buildings and kiln are in excellent order. The business is a live one, and a splendid stock of ware is now on hand, for which the purchaser of the Pottery will have first offer. The shareholders have determined to sell, feeling that a business like this can only be successfully run when under personal supervision of the owner, which cannot be obtained in a company. This is a golden opportunity for any one wishing to obtain a fair business. As the express from Souris was crossing Brackley Point Road the brakeman (shouted "Change cars at Royalty Junction for the West!"
