OUR WINTERS.—An exchange says: A reverse of seasons is supposed to take place upon the earth once in every 10,500 years, due to the varying inclination of the earth's axis. About 1,500 winters ago we entered the epoch of a more genial winter temperature, and if nothing happens to prevent, we may expect a gradual softening of our winter climate during the next nine thousand years, when another glacial epoch will begin. What sort of a country will this be in the year 11,508? Will it resemble Egypt, with remains of great buildings buried or sticking up out of sand, and known to be more than 4,000 years old?

WONDERFUL DEVELOPMENT.—The following returns show the wonderful development of the Canadian Northwest: The Canadian Pacific Railway sold in November, 1891, 8,451 acres of land to settlers, receiving for the same \$142,047, while during the same month this year the sales were 38,551 acres, worth \$124,029. From the 1st of January to the 30th November, 1891, sales were 84,232 acres, worth \$348,771, against 378,537 acres, valued at over \$1,300,000 for the same period in 1892. Besides this, there were during the present year sales for town sites to the amount of \$403,603, making the total amount received \$1,723,937.

CANADIANS COMING HOME.—An Ottawa paper says: During the week ending November 19th, seventeen families have moved into Canada from the United States by way of the Suspension Bridge. Almost all are families who had moved over to the United States thinking to better their condition, but are now satisfied that Canada is much the better place to live in. One ex-migrant from New York said: "The Globe ruined me, making me believe that Canada was a paradise. I've come back to step in a country which is fit for a white man to live in." The Grit papers and politicians have the ruin of a great many more to answer for as a result of their crusade against everything Canadian and British.
