Fifty-four cases of sunstroke in New-York, on Thursday.

The prospects for business in the United States this summer are said not to be good.

In the Lords, Thursday, the burial-bill, permitting the burial of dissenters in all churchyards and cemeteries without the Church of England service, was read a first time.

In the cricket match between the Canadian cricketers and a team of former pupils of the Royal High School at Edinburgh, the Canadians scored 89 to their adversaries 191.

In the Dublin police court, Sullivan's summons for criminal libel against the proprietor of the *Irishman*, which stated that Sullivan received money from the Carlton Club, was withdrawn on defendant apologizing and paying costs.

The Manchester *Guardian* publishes a conciliatory leading article on the fisheries question. The writer is not at all apprehensive that diplomatic correspondence on the subject will end in anything but an amicable understanding.

European emigrants have been for three or four months past arriving at New York at the rate of 47,000 per month. At \$30 each for steerage passage the amount received by the steamship lines from this source is not far short of a million and a half dollars a month.

They do things at the Antipodes on a big scale. An Exhibition closed at Sydney, New South Wales, a few days ago. The admission numbered one million and twenty thousand and the receipts nearly two hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars. The energy displayed by those Southern Britons is quite equal to any shown in that line on this Continent.

At Texas, on Thursday, May 28, the most disastrous rain storm ever known there set in. All of Brackett, except the portions on two hills, were inundated and the floors of every business house were from one to five feet under water. Several men went down. Great anxiety is felt for the safety of families along Los Moras Creek. More than 20 people have been drowned and a dozen houses washed away.

The Russian Government is severely exercised regarding the ravages of the corn beetle. The losses to the farmers this season from the destructive pest are estimated at from four million to five million pounds. Dealers in American grain are preparing to take advantage of this calamity, and call upon the United States and Canada will be very heavy. Professor Lindemur asserts that unless the Government succeeds in the efforts heretofore unsuccessful, to discover a preventative for these ravages, Russia's future as a grain growing country is gloomy indeed.

The conflict between the Civil and Ecclesiastical authorities goes on without abatement in France. The Government and Legislature of the Republic seems determined to withdraw public education in every shape and form from ecclesiastical control and supervision. One of the latest items of intelligence from the battle field is that the French Assembly by a vote of 355 to 105 passed a bill rendering useless certificates conferred by Bishops on Monks and Nuns which previously ranked for teaching purposes with Government licences. The struggle going on between the rival powers is a very remarkable one, and bids fair to be long and bitter.

The English have found the heliograph of essential use to them in their Afghan campaigns. A ten-inch mirror, the ordinary size of the heliograph for field use, will reflect the sun's rays in the form of a bright spot or flare a distance of fifty miles. Two trained sappers, each furnished with a mirror, can speak to one another, supposing the sun is shining, with an interval of fifty miles between them, provided their stations are sufficiently high and no rising ground intervenes to stop the rays. In the very centre of the mirror a little of the quicksilver is removed so that the sapper standing behind it can look through it toward the station he desires to signal. The mirror is mounted on a stand.

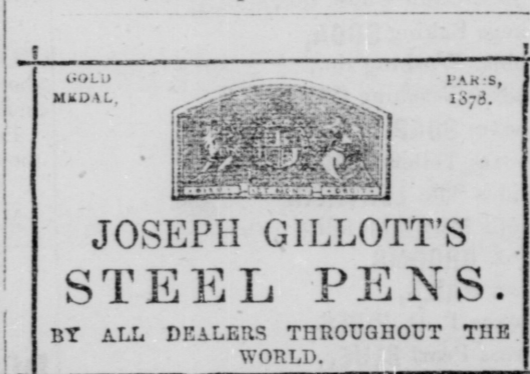

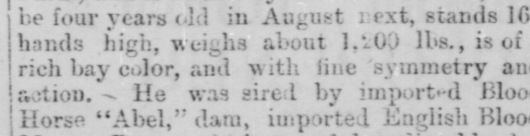
