

Millionaires Shut-out Islanders 5-0; Goalie Bessette Suffers Injury

Sydney Millionaires whipped Charlottetown Islanders 5-0 Tuesday night in their first home game this season in the Maritime Hockey League.

Late in the second period, with the Mills leading 1-0, Charlottetown lost the services of Roger Bessette, struck above the eye by the puck. Right-winger Willie MacPherson replaced him and the Mills found his weak spots early.

Sydney turned on the pressure from the start but were unable to beat Bessette, who stopped 15 shots, many at close range. Roger Guay started the scoring in the second period after receiving a long pass from Renaud Lacroix. Bessette held the fort until late in the period, when the puck caused a cut above his eye and perhaps a broken nose. He was taken to hospital for examination.

Guay slapped in another goal shortly after MacPherson donned the pads, and Stan MacDougald scored at the seven-minute mark of the third frame taking a pass from Charlie Marshall in front of the goal.

Lorne Pirie and Lacroix finished the scoring. Al Boisvert earned the season's first shutout by handling only 17 shots. The Islanders were without Buck Whitlock, last year's scoring champ, and Bobby Gray while Dan Whalen and Dune MacIntyre were not dressed for Sydney.

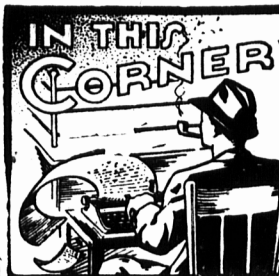
The Boosters expect a good turnout of skaters so that they may donate some financial assistance towards the successful operation of the Islanders Hockey team.

Defenceman Larry Blackburn became the first Islander to be sidelined with an injury this season when he suffered torn stomach muscles in the game against Sydney on Monday night. Coach Bucko Trainor estimated yesterday that Blackburn would be out of action for about a week. In the meantime Trainor will replace the big fellow with Charlottetown's junior MacLeod. The Islanders have two other defencemen in camp whom they can't use at the moment. Bill Tyskko, who states that he is a free agent, is being claimed by the Sydney Millionaires while Roger Pilon is on the ailing list. Tyskko went to Sydney with the Islanders last night and hopes to have his playing status cleared up by Saturday.

Bad weather yesterday evening forced the Islanders to leave the local airport one hour earlier than they had expected. As a result Buck Whitlock was unable to make the trip. His place was taken last night by Brian Lewis. With Bob Gray out of the lineup the Islanders were decidedly short-handed. They had only two regular defencemen in the persons of Gus Gustavson and Peanuts MacLaughlin, by the way is looking for a furnished apartment somewhere in the City.

Centerman Billy Watson is reportedly demanding \$5,000 for the season to play with Halifax Atlantics and this easily explains his inability to come to terms with the Halifax management. From reports Watson could get nearly that amount of money playing in other circles. He was offered a \$4,500 contract to play with Fort Wayne, Indiana and he could have drawn \$200 per week while working with Murph Chamberlain's Windsor Bulldogs. Watson will probably get his money in Halifax because if he refuses to play with the Atlantics his winger Billy Ford may also kick over the traces.

The eight team Ontario Hockey Association Senior A League is well stocked with former Maritime players this year. Among the players who were well known to local hockey fans are Johnny Ubrico and Eddy Mulligan who are playing with the Soo Greyhounds. Kenny Laufman, who last year performed with Halifax, is playing with the Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen while Ronnie Rowe of the Sydney Millionaires is working with the Sault Ste. Marie Indians and Bill Hagan, who saw a short term of service with the Islanders a year ago, is playing with the Owen Sound Mercurys.

Up in Windsor Murph Chamberlain has Lyle Wiseman, Bob Hayes, Gary Gordon and Nick Pidosny. Goalie Don Lockhart and defenceman Red Olsen are playing with the Niagara Falls Cataracts while big Phil Vitale is back with Leo Lamoureux at North Bay. P.E.I. Harness Racing Club Annual Meeting; Active Year Reported

More than fifty horsemen and followers attended the annual meeting of the P. E. Island Harness Racing Club, held at City Hall last night. The Club confines its activities to the promotion of colt breeding and racing in the Province.

Dr. R. F. Seaman the Club's president was in the chair and business was carried out briskly. Dr. Seaman's report and the financial statement by the secretary, Mr. W. Gillespie were read and adopted with a minimum of discussion. It was pointed out by Dr. Seaman in his review of the year's activities that the Colts had raced for bigger purses, namely \$700 for each stake, than ever before in the Club's history.

The President expressed thanks to the Premier Alex Matheson and Provincial government for the continued generous financial support given to the standard Breds. He also expressed appreciation for the Co-operation and very helpful financial terms given by the Summerside Trotting Association in staging this year's Futurity events.

The president, Dr. Seaman and the secretary, W. G. Gillespie were re-elected at a Directors meeting held after adjournment. The meeting was asked its opinion of the decision made last year to re-introduce the four-year old trotting class, as one of the annual stakes. It was unanimously agreed that the four-year-old event, was beneficial to the Colt breeders, and that no mistake had been made in reviving it.

"Bill" Gillespie's financial statement, given in detail was received with appreciation. Later in the evening there was a brief discussion as to whether non-money winners should be paid ten dollars as is now the custom. Mr. Gillespie agreed with the consensus of opinion that the ten dollar payment be continued.

Col. D. A. MacKinnon one of the Club's most valued supporters was unable to be present because of another engagement, but forwarded a letter expressing regrets, and congratulating the executive on its splendid management of the Club's affairs. The Colonel attached a donation of twenty dollars to his letter, the reading of which brought applause.

Secretary Gillespie also read a letter from the Summerside Raceway regretting inability of its directors to be present, and conveying wishes for the Club's continued success. It was signed by the Raceway's secretary, Jerry Sheen. Three new Directors were elected: Mr. Jack Anneer, Dr. Temple Hooper, and Archie Ferguson. These replaced retiring directors Tyndall Semple, H. T. Kennedy and the late Willard Kelly.

Dr. Seaman's report referred to the loss felt by the Club in the deaths of Mr. Kelly, Major Tom Rogers and Allie Carver.

The directors of the Club continuing office in addition to the new ones elected are: Dr. Seaman, Geo. McIntyre, Frank McKay, Harold Stead, George Brookings and Charles Willis.

Genereux won the Olympic luge shooting event at Helsinki last year and Hepburn, in overseas competition, won the world heavyweight weightlifting title. Nomination of both was unanimous.

KITCHENER, Ont., (CP) — Quebec Citadelles scored their first victory of the season Tuesday night after four straight losses, 6-4 in an Ontario Hockey Association Junior A game before 1,143 fans.

Len Amadio scored twice for the Citadelles, Stan Parker, Clermont Doyon, Gaston Pelletier and Mike Ratchford getting their remaining goals. Rene Rochet scored three times for Kitchener, Len Cressman counting their fourth tally.

Jerry's Nightmare, Jim O'Brien's sensational Three Year Old Mare driven by Earl Sample, paced in 2:09 flat to slice 3 1/2 seconds of the old record for a Maritime Bred Three Year Old Pacer. Both of these performances are remarkable and the continual improvement of all our own Island Colts is quite evident. It seems good colts are getting more plentiful every year.

All-Star Baseball Team Is Announced

NEW YORK, (AP) — Brooklyn's defeated National League champions and St. Louis' third-place Cardinals dominated the 1953 Associated Press major league all-star team, capturing half of the 30 positions.

Seven of the 16 big league clubs, four in the National, were named to the AP's eighth annual all-star squad, selected Tuesday by 179 members of the Baseball Writers' Association of America. The National League had seven players to three for the American.

Dodgers and Cardinals were the only clubs with more than one representative. The world champion New York Yankees had only one member on the all-star team, shortstop Phil Rizzuto. Phil barely squeezed in by a two-vote margin over Brooklyn's Pee Wee Reese.

Other clubs with single representatives included Washington, Cleveland, Milwaukee and Philadelphia Phillies.

Football Player Is Acquitted

OTTAWA, (CP) — Don Hollingworth, 21-year-old Ottawa Rough Rider football player, was acquitted Monday on charges of cashing three forged cheques.

A general sessions of the petty jury unanimously decided that Hollingworth was innocent of attempting to defraud W. M. Sullivan, local building contractor, of \$650. Hollingworth testified he cashed the cheques on Sullivan's instructions and that certain charges on the cheques had been authorized by the contractor. He said he had been trying his best to help Sullivan, whom he called "a very slick man."
