SONS OF TEMPERANCE—The Grand Division met at Alberton on Friday afternoon, William Ramsay, Esq., G. W. P., presiding. A large number of new members were initiated, among whom was Mr. J. P. Fielding, a son of one of the old pioneer members of the order on the Island. The public meeting was held in the Methodist Church; Mr. Fielding occupied the chair. After singing Hold the Fort and prayer by the Rev. Arthur Carr, Mr. James Birch delivered the address of welcome to the Grand Division. P. G. W. P. Carruthers delivered the address in reply. The other speakers were Rev. Geo. Steel, Hon. B. Rogers, Prof. J. T. Mellish, James Wall, Joseph Rogers, Arthur Ritchie and J. J. Chappelle. After singing God Save the Queen, one of the largest and best public meetings ever held in Alberton was brought to a close.

FOR several years past Mrs. Murdoch McSwain, who resided with her nephew, Allan McSwain, on the Colville Road, some twelve miles from the city, has been a great sufferer from what the local doctors pronounced an internal cancer. At times the pain was so severe that the poor woman would become temporarily insane, and threaten to kill herself in order to be relieved from her terrible sufferings. She was closely watched in order to prevent her carrying her threats into execution. On Friday morning, however, while suffering severely, she stole out to an out-house, and taking up a pair of leather reins, threw one end over a beam and tied the other round her neck. The beam not being sufficiently high to admit of her hanging there from, she threw her whole weight, upwards of two hundred pounds on the reins, and strangled herself. When discovered she was dead. She was between seventy and eighty years of age, and a widow. An inquest has been held.

IT is with sincere regret that we have to record the death of Mr. J. P. Oxley, which took place at his residence, Harrington Street, on June 3. Mr. Oxley was a native of Prince Edward Island, arrived here with a party of settlers from that colony about thirty years ago, and at once established a manufactory of blocks, pumps and other shipping appliances. This business was subsequently amalgamated with that of his sons, Messrs. J. and D. Oxley, ship-chandlers of the Queen Street wharf. Mr. Oxley was of a genial kindly disposition, and no man was better known or more personally popular in shipping circles. Except for an affection of the right which produced partial blindness, he enjoyed very good health until recently. He was 68 years of age. In token of respect for the memory of the deceased all vessels in port hoisted their flags half-mast high. The funeral took place on June 4 and was largely attended.—Auckland, New Zealand, paper.

Seine Boats, etc., Seized.

THE SCHOONERS ESCAPE.

SOURIS, July 25.

The fisheries protection schooner Critic yesterday captured two seine boats, seines and fourteen men belonging to the American fishing schooners Colonel J. H. French and Argonaut. The capture was effected off East Point. The schooners escaped. There is a large fleet here and plenty of fish.

LATER.

SOURIS, July 25.

There are twenty sail of American fishermen in port, and there is great excitement over the capture of the boats and seines of the Colonel J. H. French and Argonaut. Captain McLaren, of the Critic, is right on his mettle. He has had hard work for the last two days in keeping the hundred sail of American fishing vessels outside the limit.

Terrific Cloud Burst.

GREAT BARRINGTON, Mass., July 24.

On Saturday, a cloud burst at Hillsdale, N. Y., twelve miles distant. The water divided on the mountain range. Half went down the Harlan Road, doing great damage and many bridges were swept away. An engine was sent out, but a bridge behind was carried away and the engine became stranded and traffic was suspended. The Hillsdale Plough Works are gone. The water rose ten feet in half an hour.

GREEN RIVER, July 24.

In all 10 bridges are gone. Acres of grain are destroyed. Eighteen lives are reported lost.

O'Brien's Opinion

LONDON, July 24.

In an interview to-day on the subject of the Irish land bill, Mr. William O'Brien said the first effect would be to destroy the majority of landlords in Ireland. The next effect would be to destroy the Government, which had purchased offices with concessions destructive to the Conservative party. After a bitter struggle of six months the ministry had adopted Parnell's bill, and it was the plan of campaign that had forced them to pursue the present course.

Hanlan Defeats Gaudaur.

PULLMAN, Ill., July 24.

The second great race between the oarsmen Hanlan and Gaudaur was rowed last night in the dark. Hanlan's time was 20.32. Gaudaur finished an eighth of a mile behind, and that much wide of his course. The race was a hippodrome. Gaudaur didn't want to row in bad water and wouldn't try.

Shot Through His Side.

TORONTO, July 23.

While Perry Macdonald was rowing on the lake opposite the rifle butts here, this p. m., a stray bullet fired by a volunteer, struck him in the side, passed clean through him, bodily injuring him fatally.

QUEBEC, July 23.

The bark Mary E. Cann is held at quarantine at Grosse Ile, having smallpox on board among the crew.
