On the rail will be Elmer Ferguson's Hurrah and Elmer will be sculling out of there to try and keep the rail position to the all-important quarter. The George Semple owned trotter Little Art who trotted his last time out in 2:07 1/5 in head of the class to the wire and the thought is, Alcyre Pineau will be trying to break the track record of 2:06 4/5 held by Topway. Shotgun Hanover going out there from the third spot and handled by Doux Hill won a dash in 2:09 last week. The Don Macdonald owned Rose Robin with Clark Smith-up will leave from number four slot and the mare will look sharper each time out. Elmer Wick, the Greenbrae owned entry, leaves from the tough fifth spot and the mare will be handled by Joe Hennessey for this event.

Crowd pleaser Yankee Blaze has drawn number six but very few horses have the speed to leave from there and so the long route on the first turn and still have enough steam to hold off the balance of the field for a drive to the wire. Trailing out of seventh positions is the great pacer Yankee Timber owned by Jack Brown and handled by Joey Smallwood, who will have his work cut up for him to head this field to the wire. Summerside Race Action Has Exciting Finishes

SUMMERSIDE — There was fine racing weather again in Summerside and the big crowd enjoyed some finishes that were just thrilling last night at the Summerside Raceway, especially those who bet on George Callbeck's Adioscot's Dream, a four-year-old brown pacer horse who took both ends of the feature early closer event with a pay of \$10.25 in his first race ever.

He also paid \$125.90, the largest pay of the night, on the exactor in the fifth race in combination with Brewer's Best.

The youngster beat such horses as Rustico Bay, who less than two weeks ago lowered his record to 2:14.4, and Spanish Way, an experienced 5-year-old with a record of 2:10.2.

In the other \$10.25 early closer, Doc Price took both the first and fourth dashes in times of 2:15.4 and 2:14.3, not coming close to his record of 2:12.1, set just Saturday night at the local oval.

Besides Adioscot's Dream and Doc Price, double-dash winner was Fastaway, who took the third and seventh dashes in times of 2:13 and 2:14 flat. The 2:13 was the fastest time of the night.

Other special pays were \$16.90 on the Daily Double on races one and two; \$44 on the exactor on Race Nine; and \$15.30 on the Quinella on race seven.

Indians Defeat Orioles; Tigers Beat 'Pale Hose'

CLEVELAND (AP) — Max Alvis hit a three-run triple and Fred Whitfield clouted a two-run homer Wednesday night to lead Cleveland Indians to a 9-6 victory over Baltimore Orioles despite five home runs by the Orioles.

Frank Robinson and Boog Powell both hit two homers for the Orioles.

Whitfield also knocked in a run with a single in the third inning, when the Indians came up with five runs.

The big blow in that uprising was Alvis' triple to centre Baltimore's Russ Snyder made a stab at a shoestring catch, but the ball got by him, letting Whitfield, Chuck Hinton and Rocky Colavito score. Chico Salmon's single, scoring Alvis, capped the rally.

The Orioles didn't score off Sonny Siebert until the fourth, when Powell and Sam Bowen hit back-to-back homers.

DETROIT (AP) — Jim Northrup's two-run homer capped a three-run rally in the ninth inning, giving the Detroit Tigers a 3-1 victory over the Chicago White Sox Wednesday night in the first game of a doubleheader.

Northrup's ninth homer, on a pitch from reliever Hoyt Wilhelm, also scored Orlando McFarlane, who had driven in the tying run with a one-out single off losing pitcher Bruce Howard.

The White Sox had broken a scoreless duel between Howard and winner Mickey Lolich in the top of the ninth on Ken Berry's homer, the first run off Detroit pitching in 25 innings.

Lolich and Howard battled through eight innings, giving up only five hits between them.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Left-hander Bob Veale, staked to a first-inning lead on Roberto Clemente's two-run homer, scattered seven hits, outduelling rookie Don Sutton as Pittsburgh Pirates defeated Los Angeles Dodgers 3-1 Wednesday night.

Veale, making his first start in two weeks because of a back ailment, struck out 11 while posting his 12th victory against six defeats. He was in serious trouble only once—in the second inning when the Dodgers loaded the bases with one out—but ended the threat by getting Jeff Torborg to hit into a double.

The fifth inning powered the surging Philadelphia Phillies past Houston Astros 7-6 Wednesday night for their sixth straight victory.

The Phils trailed 4-2 in the fifth when John Briggs walked, Cookie Rojas singled and Rich Allen reached on an error, loading the bases. White then belted the first pitch from Carroll Sembera over the right field wall for his 19th homer of the season and seventh career grand slam.

Philadelphia added a run in the eighth before the Astros closed the gap on John Bateman's two-run homer in the ninth off winner Larry Jackson. Jackson, who also gave up a three-run homer by Chuck Harrison and a solo blast by Bob Aspromonte, posted his 11th victory against nine setbacks but needed relief help after Bateman's homer.

NEW YORK (AP) — Jim Hart's grand-slam home run and Tom Haller's second homer of the game sparked a seven-run seventh-inning for National League-leading San Francisco Giants Wednesday and set them to an 11-1 victory over New York Mets.

Gaylord Perry picked up his 16th victory of the season against two losses, as the Giants maintained a one-game lead over Pittsburgh, which beat Los Angeles 3-1 Wednesday.

Larry Elliot homered in the eighth for the lone Met run. It was the Giants' third straight victory over the Mets and their fourth triumph in a row.

CHICAGO (AP) — Knuckleballer Ken Johnson pitched a five-hitter and Felipe Alou scored both runs as Atlanta Braves defeated Chicago Cubs 2-0 Wednesday.

Johnson struck out 10 in scoring his ninth victory against seven losses. He allowed only one Cub runner to reach second base. It was Randy Hundley who doubled in the fifth inning.

The Braves picked up their first run in the opening inning on Alou's infield single, a walk, a passed ball and Hundley's throwing error.

Aou led off the third inning with a double, moved to third on Mack Jones' fly and scored on Hank Aaron's sacrifice fly to deep centre.

Riders Gamble; Capture Opener

OTTAWA (CP) — Ottawa Rough Riders came from behind with a fourth-quarter touchdown, then hung on for a 10-8 Eastern Football Conference victory over Montreal Alouettes before 19,599 fans at Lansdowne Park Wednesday night.

Riders opened the scoring on a 20-yard field goal by tackle Moe Racine on the last play of the first half. A third-quarter pass interception by halfback Joe Poirier set up the game-winning touchdown.

Poirier grabbed a pass from Montreal quarterback Bernie Faloney on the Montreal 25-yard line but his dash into the end zone was nullified by a clipping penalty against Ottawa.

This moved the ball back to the Montreal 32. Eight plays later, after two successful third-down gambles, quarterback Russ Jackson hit flanker Whit Tucker with a nine-yard touchdown pass.

Faloney scored Montreal's touchdown on a four-yard end sweep in the third quarter after marching his club 60 yards in five plays.

Flanker Peter Kempf kicked the convert and end Gino Bertetta added a single on a 50-yard punt in the fourth quarter.

Angels Lead League Loop

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — California Angels, playing in the smallest city in the majors, have become the first American League club to top 1,000,000 in attendance this season.

Playing their first year in the plus Anaheim stadium, the Angels have caught fire both at the boxoffice and on the field.

President Robert O. Reynolds expected a good start because of the novelty of big league baseball hereabouts. But the fan turnout exceeded expectations. And the team is third in the standings.

Island Shooters Are Faring Well

SOUTH MARCH, ONT. (Special) — With the first three days of the DCR prize meet completed, Tpr. Eldon MacLean of Charlottetown is leading the 16-land squad with an aggregate of 345 of a possible 375 points.

Rumors around the range camp are that the top individual aggregate is in the vicinity of 355.

Next in line among the Islanders are: Tpr. Perley Taylor of Wausio; T. Mary MacLennan Lea of Crapaud; and F.O. Dave Phoenix, CFB Summerside, each with 339. They are followed by Tpr. Ray Vessey, York, 334 and Lt. George Rogers, Charlottetown, 337.

Wednesday's matches were fired in wind conditions which frequently approached gale force and this was well indicated in the majority of the scores registered. In the morning match, the MacDonald Tobacco at 300 and 600 yards five Islanders placed in the prize list. They were: Tpr. MacLean 117, 20th; Lt. Rogers, 111-172nd; and WO 2 Mike Sussick, CFB Summerside, 111-187th. Tpr. Fred White of Murray Harbor with 110 placed 213th while Cdt. Scott MacDonal of Charlottetown placed fourth in the cadet prize list with 107.

The first event of the afternoon, the Gatineau, fired from 1000 yards, due to the heavy winds, produced some disastrous results as was evidenced from the majority of scores recorded.

Three Islanders placed in this event. Tpr. White placed 14th with 31 of 35 points. Others were F.O. Phoenix, 70th with 28, and Tpr. MacLean 86th with 27.

In the final match of the day, the Alexander of Tunis, seven Islanders got into the prize list, which ended with three shooters with scores of 40 out of 50.
