THERE were 130 interments in the Montreal city cemeteries last week, 75 being those of children under five years.

CONVERTED \$2 notes of the Union Bank of P. E. I. are being pushed on the Miramichi. They are well worn.

APPLES in Maine are suffering from the ravages of insects, and a crop only about one-third that of last year is expected.

SENATOR SHERMAN admits that the Dominion is quite right in catching and punishing all thieves who persist in stealing fish.

It is said that the three men who have burglarized numerous places in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, have found their way to the island.

THE Commander of the S.S. Acadia, Capt. Gordon, reports that there are now very few fishing vessels remaining off the North side of this Province.

THE Rev. V. E. Harris, of Amherst, and the Rev. Mr. Wiggins, of Sackville, are soon to take trip across to the Old Country, and be absent for about six months.

THE usual careful preparations have been made by English, European and American astronomers for the observation of the total solar eclipse on August 19. All the latest knowledge and newest appliances will doubtless be brought into requisition, and it is earnestly to be hoped that the atmospheric conditions will be favorable. The line of totality is about 125 miles wide, extending from Berlin through Southern Siberia and Japan to the Pacific Ocean.

Destructive Fire.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 12. The most disastrous fire known here for many years is now raging in the heart of the city, and the damage will reach up in the millions. The fire started in Campbell & Dicks carpenter shop, rear of Fifth Avenue. Hamilton's nine-story building adjoining, Schmid & Friday's building, another fine structure, nine stories, and the Despatch building are now burning fiercely and at midnight there were no indications of the fire being controlled. No casualties have been reported.

Laying the Corner Stone.

HALIFAX, Aug. 12. The corner stone of All Saints Cathedral, to be built in commemoration of the centenary of the first Colonial diocese, was laid to-day by the Metropolitan, who preached at St. Luke's in the morning. Coadjutor Bishop Kingston, and the bishops of Springfield, Mass., assisted. The full choral service was performed at St. Luke's in the morning, taken part in by most all the clergymen, after which the bishops gave an address.

The Suez Canal.

PARIS, Aug. 12. Several newspapers announce that the English and French Governments have agreed upon a basis of a plan for the neutralization of the Suez Canal. A convention embodying the principles they assert has been framed, and its signature by the two Governments will be expected.

Bodies Identified.

CHATTSMOUTH, ILL., Aug. 12. The bodies of 150 victims of yesterday's railroad disaster have been identified.

British and Foreign.

Belgium is giving attention to laws regulating the sale of intoxicating drinks. One of the provisions is that no dealer shall give credit for drinks. This would be a great relief to some bar-keepers in this country.

Prof. Tyndall has written another scathing article, attacking Mr. Gladstone. He says that all the facts tend to verify the fact that Gladstone is merely a resonant mask through which John Morley blows over the land his fanatical treason.

The Radical newspapers in Paris violently criticize the pro-Bismarckian policy of Signor Crispi, the new Italian Premier, and urge France to ally herself firmly with Russia, by doing which they say she will be enabled to despise a central European alliance.

Mr. Gladstone writes: "It is painful for me to have my attention called to attacks made upon me by Mr. Bright. My desire is to bear them in silence, and remember only his patriotism and services together with his unwavering friendship down to 1886."

It is semi-officially stated in Copenhagen that the recent articles in the German press, imputing to Denmark plans of revenge against Germany because of her action in fortifying Copenhagen, have produced astonishment among the Danish Ministers. The Ministers point to the fact that it is a matter of common knowledge that the erection of forts in and around Copenhagen has no other object than that of securing the neutrality of Denmark, and say that the Government is resolved, under no circumstances, to abandon the work.

Alice Barry defied the police who went to execute a writ of eviction against her at Knockade, County Antrim, on the 9th inst. She barricaded her home and, with the assistance of some friends, defied it for a long time against the large force of officers who attempted to take it by storm, and who were many times repulsed by volleys of stones and streams of boiling water thrown upon them. The police finally captured the house by a charge with fixed bayonets, but not until many of them were hurt and badly pitched. Five of the defenders of Alice Barry were placed under arrest.
