Final contract—six hearts.
Opening lead—three of diamonds.
Back in 1933 the Franklin Bridge Club, Philadelphia, staged its annual team-of-four club bridge championship tournament. It was no world-shaking event; the winners even if their names could be recalled would stir no great amount of excitement; but one hand which was dealt in this contest was of a remarkable nature.

The bidding by the North-South players probably varied a great deal at the different tables but practically all hands on deck arrived at a contract of six hearts, a reasonable enough undertaking. Wherever the singleton diamond was opened declarer inevitably went down.

The South hand wandered from table to table searching for a declarer capable of making the contract, but never encountered one. It was only in subsequent analysis that a brilliant suggestion was advanced which pointed to the proper series of plays by declarer to fulfill the slam contract.

Declarer plays low from dummy on the opening diamond lead, takes the ace, draws three trumps, and cashes the king of diamonds, learned that East has two diamonds winners. All plays have been normal to date, and South must seek a way to overcome his apparent defeat.

The ace of spades is next played, followed by the deuce. When West plans low, declarer finesesses the ten, then followed by the lead of the king of clubs from dummy. South discarding the king of spades.

All these strange plays are not without effect. South has lost one trick, remains with two diamond losers, but West is on lead and the contract is in the bag. West must return a club or a spade, and South discards the diamond losers on the club and spade queens.

Ingenuity in bridge knows no bounds. It would be a harsh critic who censured himself for missing the play shown and, in fact, history records that not one South who played this hand in the tournament cut his throat that night.

But the fact remains that in the puristic sense each South should have followed this line of play, since it was the only way the contract could be made.

Will Clear Half English And Welsh Slums Within 5 Years

LONDON (Reuters)—The slums in half the main centres in England and Wales are scheduled to disappear in the next five years under a slum-clearance plan announced by the ministry of housing and local government.

Statistics released by the ministry show that one in 15 homes in England and Wales is unfit to live in. Of these, 44 per cent should be demolished in the next five years. Most of the cleared areas will be in the smaller centres. In the big cities, the task of clearing will take considerably longer.

Officials believe that the battle may be won in 20 years, and they estimate that about 500,000 additional acres of land may be required for re-settling the families.
