

# Successful Swimming Meet Held At S'side

Favored with a hot sunny day and lots of warm salt water, the island's best swimmers competed in 22 classes for top honors in the annual P. E. I. swim meet held at the Marine Wharf in Summerside yesterday afternoon under the sponsorship of the Summerside Y's Men's Club. Against the picturesque and nautical setting of speedboats, sailboats and row boats cruising about the harbor, the meet was held on the west side of the Marine Wharf in an enclosed fifty yards course. Thoughtful programme arrangements had provided adequate "grandstand" seating facilities for the large crowd of spectators that was present from many island points.

Programmes had been printed and were distributed to the spectators, who were at all times kept informed of the classification of the event in progress, the name and home town of the contestants, the winners of each event and other information interestingly described in a continuous commentary over a public address system by Messrs Ralph Emery and Ross MacKenzie.

A refreshment stand beside the diving tower catered to the thirst and appetite of the crowd. An interesting water safety and water rescue display was demonstrated by two swimming instructors.

The large number of contestants and non-competants who enjoyed the water at yesterday's meet appeared to be completely at ease in the water and rarely does a competition of any kind indicate the eagerness and whole hearted enjoyment as that displayed yesterday.

Following the competition, the winners were guests of the Summerside Y's Men's Club for supper at Robson's Restaurant where ribbons and trophies were presented.

The final score in the unofficial "points competition" turned out to be a landslide for Prince County. This was largely the result of incomplete attendance of the Kings and Queens County competitors, although the ones who did come to Summerside took a great many of the awards. Kings County had 37 points, Queens County 26, and Prince County 109 points.

Outstanding in this contest was the contribution of P-O Judson Hudson who won all three of his races to score 15 points. Joanne Smith of Summerside who won

two of her races and came second in another to score 13 points, and Sheila DeLory of Georgetown who won two of her races and came third in another for 11 points.

Speakers at the dinner included P.O. Ralph Emery, Mr. Paul Cudmore, Charlottetown, Mr. Charles Linkletter, president of the Summerside Y's Men's Club which sponsored the meet and Dr. Ray Barrett of Charlottetown who presented cups and ribbons which were supplied by The Dept. of Physical Fitness.

About 60 were entered in this the third annual swimming meet.

### Mawhinney Eliminated

VANCOUVER, Aug. 27 (CP) — Bill Mawhinney's bid to regain the Canadian amateur golf championship he won in 1950 was turned aside today in the third round of this year's tournament by a comparatively unknown player from Vancouver.

Mawhinney, 1950 champion who left a hospital bed to enter the tournament, lost 2 and 1 to fellow townsman Dick Moore, a 45-year-old Vancouver veteran who first took the British Columbia amateur title 25 years ago.

Jerry Kesseling of Kitchener, Ont., was upset 3 and 2 in the fourth round by Bob Gray, Winnipeg hockey player, who fired six birdies by getting near to the pin with outstanding chip shots while the Kitchener player's putter let him down.

The failure of Mawhinney and Kesseling to come through was a big blow, but there are other Canadians, notably Nick Westlock of Windsor, Ont., and Doug Silverberg of Red Deer, Alta., who might conceivably beat back the Americans' challenge.
