don of Dr. Helmuth Wohlthat, German economic expert, suggested he was aiming at getting economic assistance in return for "a certain part of the Dominion."

The latter report appeared bolstered to some extent by acknowledgment in government quarters that Dr. Wohlthat had been in touch "officially" with British trade officials, sounding them out on the possibility of improving British-German trade relations. It was emphasized there were only unofficial talks but might lead to "more concrete proposals."

Government circles denied the appearance rumors and said they were originating. One official suggested they might be coming from an appeasement group in Parliament without Mr. Chamberlain's knowledge.

Disturbance Unjustified
EDMONTON, July 21 (CP)—Disturbance at the Legislature on July 7 was caused without justification by a few agitators, Hon. W. A. Fallow, minister of public works declared today after studying a transcript of the evidence given at an investigation. "There was no cause for this disturbance and I have instructed the warden to deal with agitators as he would do in the ordinary course of events," said Mr. Fallow.

Transfer Of Ship Under Consideration
LONDON, July 21—(CP Cable)—Sir Edward Heath, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, said today that one of the "Duchess" ships now plying between Montreal, Quebec and New Orleans may be transferred to the Pacific service. Such a move, Sir Edward said, is under consideration with a view to improving the Pacific service. Construction of new tonnage for the service has been delayed because of high costs, he said.

Mr. Arthur LeBlanc Hold Crippled Children's Camp At Marshfield

Mr. Arthur LeBlanc's many friends in this city will be glad of the unqualified success of his youth recital in the Lyric Hall, New York on July 17th last. The concert was under the distinguished patronage of His Honour Percival H. LeGarde, Mayor of New York and was organized by the Municipal Opera Association of New York. The vast audience filled the hall, among the promoters, Mme. Ann Cox Kelsey, Douglas C. Cole, Canadian Commissioner of Trade and Commerce, New York, M. Godfrey Haggard, British Consul General New York.

For the fourth consecutive year the Prince Edward Island Junior Red Cross is conducting a camp for crippled children. Some of the campers are Junior Red Cross patients who especially need to be built up for operative treatment while others are in the convalescent stage. Three of the children are not allowed to walk at all; others walk with the aid of crutches and several get about without assistance. Those in attendance are children who particularly need sun, nourishment, fresh air, rest or the discipline of supervised training. The number in attendance at any camp is not large but the period covers as many weeks as possible in mid-summer. The campers this year vary in age from two to thirteen years. Several have been in attendance in the past but the time comes again and it is a great delight to see the improvement in their conditions and to realize how many of them have been so improved that it is not now necessary to have them present this year.

Visitors are welcome on afternoons at the camp which is being held at the farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Les Mill, Marshfield. Mr. and Mrs. Catherine MacLean, Director of Junior Red Cross in P. E. I. and New Brunswick and Miss Verne Darrach, R. N. are in charge of the Camp.

148 Candidates

Against 41 Liberals and 38 representatives of the co-operative commonwealth federation. Nominations have advanced much further in Ontario and the western provinces than in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces. Few candidates have been named by any party east of the Ottawa River.

As the Conservative and C.C.F. parties have comparatively few candidates in the present House of Commons nominations built up in their preparations for the election that is the case with the other parties.

Comparatively few candidates have entered the field so far. There are two Communists, one in Ontario and one in Quebec; one Conservative-Labor, in Ontario; one Social Credit, in British Columbia; seven in Manitoba, three in each of Quebec, Prince Edward Island and Saskatchewan and Alberta and none in Nova Scotia or New Brunswick.

Liberals have 17 in Ontario, 19 in Alberta, one in Saskatchewan, one in each of Prince Edward Island and British Columbia and none in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick or Prince Edward Island.

Hon. H. H. Stevens is leaving his present post of Minister of Education to contest Kamloops as a Conservative. Mr. Stevens went to Kootenay east when he met defeat in Vancouver in 1937 but was called to the Bennett cabinet. He broke with the Conservative party and led the Reconstruction party. Now he is back in British Columbia and the leadership of Hon. R. J. Manion.

Arthur Roebuck, former Ontario attorney-general, is another attempting the jump from the legislature to parliament. He has been nominated by the Liberals in Toronto-Trinity, the seat captured in 1936 by Hugh Flaxton from Hon. Bernard Craxley, then Minister of Justice.

Another is J. R. Diefenbacher, youthful leader of the Conservative party in Saskatchewan. Mr. Diefenbacher will contest Kamloops Centre but does not have to give up a legislative seat to do so as his party won no seats at the last Saskatchewan election. J. S. Woodsworth of the C.C.F. is the only party leader nominating so far. He will contest his old riding of Winnipeg North.
